NOTE: For all tax data extracted into this present summary for John and Frankey, see the two tax-list reports above. Those reports provide full neighborhood groupings, year by year, as well as analysis.

My interest in **Frankey Mills** and her husband stems from the possibility that she was the mother of **William Mills** (b. c1783–88 of unknown parentage), whose male line descendants carry a **Whitt/Witt Y**. William Mills-Witt emerged 1806 in the then-adjacent county of Franklin and made a cameo appearance in Giles in 1816—17, witnessing land leases for the White family associate John Toney. For all *proved* information on this William Mills, see "William Mills (b. c1783–88; d. c1863); Spouse Drucilla Kemp: Research Notes," a working file last updated 28 August 2018; archived at E. S. Montgomery and Giles Counties offer a second candidate for William's mother: **Sarah Mills.** She arrived in the Walker's Creek area about the same time as Frankey and, like Frankey, was a young unmarried mother. In 1791, she wed Elijah Sartain of Montgomery with Rev. Alexander Ross officiating, as he did for Frankey and John White. For Sarah's parents and her Amherst Co. origin, see See E. S. Disambiguation:

Giles Co., VA (1806–c1818, Big Spring; cSept 1818–21, Brush Creek of East River)

This John White should not be confused with the John White of Little Sugar Run of Walker's Creek, c1787–1796, who "signed" his documents with an 'S' and wed Susannah Marcum, daughter of John Marcum in 1796 before dropping out of Montgomery County. In this summary of data for Frankey's John, I will include key records that disambiguate the men. I will also include documents created by John Sr.'s proposed sons, in order to show the familial interactions between them.

## APPARENT CHILDREN OF JOHN BY UNKNOWN WIFE:

1. JOHN "JACK" WHITE JR., born c1760–65 according to the 1820–30 censuses, aka "John White H," "John White (hunter)," "John H. White," and "John Hunter White." This John's first known appearance on record is the 1787 Montgomery petition he signed as part of a cluster: "John White Sr., John White Jr., Beniman White." Their signatures appear amid residents of the Copley neighborhorhood of Montgomery County. The trio then left the county; their intermittent returns between 1791 and 1798 suggest they had livelihood elsewhere. By bond dated 8 June 1793, John Jr. married Nancy Copley, whose brother "Thomas Copley Jr." had served as bondsman for the August 1792 "John White Sr." marriage to Frankey Mills.

Montgomery tax rolls from 1793 through 1806 show John Jr. submitting his tax lists within the John Sr.—Benjamin White cluster between Wolf Creek and East River or with his proposed brother James in the Salt Pond Mountain region across New River from Copley's Ford. (See James, below.) Several of those rolls explicitly call him "John Jr." About 1794—96, he and Robert White claimed land adjacent to Randall Lucas's 1796 claim at Salt Pond.<sup>6</sup> (See Robert, below.) John appears to have left the land in the possession of Robert, who disposed of it while John was absent from the tax rolls between 1795 and 1798. John's absence from home may be explained by subsequent tax-roll references to him as "John White (Hunter)." In 1800, he signed a petition of settlers "north of Wolf

Creek" in upper Giles, in a cluster of consecutive names that also suggests his birth family and siblings: "John White, John White Jr., Benjn. White, James White, Arthur White." About 1804 he returned to the neighborhood of his inlaws, having land surveyed in Camping Hollow about a mile west of New River. A plat of that land was indexed contemporaneously under the name "White, John (Hunter)." In 1809, he expanded his holdings onto New River, buying land from the Snodgrass family who, in 1810, would also sell land to John's proposed brother James White. In that same year (1810), John and wife Nancy executed a deed to 100 acres of their Camping Hollow land; and in 1816 they disposed of 100 acres in the same locale, one mile from New River. At that time, they relocated at nearby Bear Spring, below Walker Creek, buying Waddell and Morgan land that would trigger years of debt suits.

It was there at Bear Spring, near Gap Mountain, that John Jr. and Nancy would remain until their deaths. John's 1847 will (written 19 May and proved 11 September) named his wife Nancy and several children. The tax rolls identify him in various ways that can be linked through his specific data, through the identity of the individuals who submitted their lists of taxables on the same day, and through the correlation of deeds, court records, and petitions. A deed of gift by John in 1822, when he tried to shelter family land from his creditor, specifically names a son *William* (first cited as a tithable under his own name in 1818). The tax rolls suggest six other sons: *John Jr.* (first named in 1816), *Thomas* (first named in 1817), *Acles "Ake"* (first named in 1826), *David* (first named in 1828), *Oratio* (first named in 1831), and *Rhasa* (first named in 1835). A marriage record of 20 April 1846 names a daughter *Rachel* who married her cousin Levi H. White. John's will names three younger children: *Robert, Sally*, and *Nancy*. A *possibility remains* that John and Nancy might have been the parents of *Editha White* who married William White in 1816.

2. **?HANNAH WHITE**, born c1763; apparently died after 14 September 1824.<sup>19</sup> As a female, her name would appear on the tax rolls only if she owned land, held slaves, or had young tithables in her household. Thus, she was cited only on the 1798 personal tax roll, charged with two young tithable males, unnamed. In 1799, she was dropped and two new male tithables came onto the roll: **Arter** and **John**. She appears to be the unmarried Hannah White to whom John White Jr. attempted to convey part of his land, to keep from losing it, when he was jailed for debt and forced to sell all property in 1822. The two males who appeared in 1799, the year she was dropped from the roll, are

- ARTHUR "ARTER" WHITE, b. by 1782; who signed the 1800 petition of settlers North of Wolf Creek consecutively with John Sr., John Jr., Benjamin, and James. He was first taxed in his own name in 1799 and was 1807 bondsman for Samuel Mills, son of John White Sr.'s wife Frankey. 10 I have not found him in Giles thereafter. A 1970s-era history of Logan County, West Virginia (formerly Cabell < Tazewell < Montgomery), places Arthur as son of Benjamin White of Sugar Run (brother of John who married Susannah Marcum). However, the tax rolls of Cabell include no Arthur or "Arter" through at least 1821. 21
- JOHN WHITE, b. by 1782; taxed in his own name in Montgomery Co., 1799 (with Arter), 1801, 1802 (with Arter), 1803, 1804–5 (with Arter), and in Giles 1806 (with Arter) as "John White, hunter." Not found after 1806. He appears to have moved to the area that became Cabell. I have not yet systematically researched that county.
- 3. **BENJAMIN WHITE SR.** (BENJAMIN H. WHITE, after 1806<sup>22</sup>) born *c*1765; married 10 July 1787, Ann Goodwin, Amherst County.<sup>23</sup> In November 1787, he signed (as "Beniman") the Montgomery County petition with John Sr. and John Jr. in the Copley neighborhood. However the trio appear to have been transients passing through Montgomery at the time of the petition—possibly enroute to the ginseng camps of Cole River and the Kanawha; there is no evidence of their residence in Montgomery until 1792. The 1790–92 tax rolls of *Amherst County* assess Benjamin amid Ann's family, but do not include John Sr. or Jr.<sup>24</sup> Subsequently, John Sr. and John Jr. married in Montgomery in 1792 and 1793, and appear on Montgomery's tax rolls intermittently throughout the 1790s, but Benjamin has not been found in Montgomery's local records until 1797. In that year—the first year John Sr. and Frankey can be placed at Big Spring along the southwest foot of East River Mountain (just east of what would soon be Montgomery-Tazewell line)—John Sr. and Benjamin submitted their tax rolls in that neighborhood on the same day.

Two years later, as a chain carrier for the surveyor and land speculator Gordon Cloyd, Benjamin staked his claim to a tract at Brush Creek of East River. According to a statement by Cloyd in 1813, Benjamin "wanted to possess himself of the survey and it was then agreed if the said Benjamin White Complied with the verbal bargain then ... Cloyd would convey such right." However, Benjamin sold his interest to James Copley (whose sister had married John White Jr. in 1793). and apparently stayed on with John Sr. at Big Spring. In 1800, consecutively with John White Sr. and Jr., James White, and Arthur White, Benjamin signed a petition by settlers "on New River below Wolf Creek Mountain." In 1804, he finally purchased land from Alexander Stuart on Little Wolf Creek of the

Bluestone, <sup>27</sup> a few miles from John Sr. Both areas would be cut away into Giles in 1806.

Beginning in 1807, Benjamin White adopted the initial H and used that initial (but never a middle name) for almost all records he created across the next twenty-three years. On 5 May 1807, he witnessed the marriage permission that John White and wife Frankey gave to her son Samuel Mills.<sup>28</sup> On 16 April 1808, he did jury duty.<sup>29</sup> In the fall of 1808 he was sued by the controversial entrepreneur John Toney of East River, a man with whom he and his offspring would display a curious friend-and-foe relationship for years to come. Toney, after a deadly attack on his Cole River ginseng camp by Native Americans in the mid-1780s, had retired from the hunt, settled in Montgomery, and established a robust plantation enterprise with mills, a ferry, a store, and a tavern along New River, from East River on the north to Wolf Creek on the south. In the wake of the 1808 suit by Toney, Benjamin raised funds to settle the suit by selling his Wolf Creek land. 30 Just months later, on 1 June 1809, he and Toney appeared together at the house of the Toney neighbor Peter Dingess to witness Peter's donation of land to sons John and Charles.<sup>31</sup> The following day, Benjamin and Toney witnessed Peter's will.<sup>32</sup> After a June 1809 stint on the county's petit jury,<sup>33</sup> Benjamin was again sued by Toney in the September term of court—this time jointly with Samuel Mills's brotherin-law William Murphy, Nimrod Smith, and Thomas Little. (Toney's suit was directed at Murphy, but White, Smith, and Little had served as Murphy's special bail.)<sup>34</sup> In February 1810, Benjamin was called as a witness in the case of Commonwealth vs. Adam, Ezekiel, and Benjamin Smith who stood accused of grand larceny for the alleged theft of hemp from premises of Isaac French;35 and in September 1810, Benjamin did another round of jury dury. 36

During Benjamin's landless years (1809–16), the tax rolls and census cluster him intermittently with John White Sr. (his proposed father) on East River and with two landowning Whites in southeastern Giles, his proposed brothers John White Jr. (aka Jack White, John Hunter White, "John White H") and James (aka "James White H"). The 1810 census, begun in August of that year, enumerates "Benjamin H. White" as a head of household over the age of 45, with a female 26–44, two males 18–25, three females 10–15, and two males and two females aged 0–10.<sup>37</sup> In 1811, he and both John White Sr. and Jr. were jointly sued by Philip Miller, who had previously served as a special bail for

James White.<sup>38</sup> (In this case, John Sr. was the principal debtor, while John Jr. and Benjamin H.—proposed sons of John Sr.—served as sureties for the debt.)

In 1814, Benjamin temporarily stalled off a suit for debt against him by John Peters but was ordered in the October term of court to pay Peters \$53.54 plus damages and costs.<sup>39</sup> By November 1816, he was on sound-enough footing financially to make the first of two land purchases from Benjamin Stuart's estate on **Christians Fork of Brush Creek.**<sup>40</sup> This land, which he bought as "Benjamin White," lay adjacent to John Toney. There, in early 1818, he was joined by the old John White Sr.; again, they turned in their tax lists on the same day.<sup>41</sup> In September of that year, he and John petitioned for an alteration of the road from "mouth of the Five mile fork of East River to the poney crossing of Brush Creek.<sup>42</sup> In June 1819 (as "Benjamin H."), he and wife "Nancy" sold the two tracts he had bought (under the name "Benjamin") on Christian's Fork of Brush Creek.<sup>43</sup>

At this point, Benjamin and Ann moved further westward, although Benjamin would intermittently appear in Giles records for the next several years. The 1820 enumerator found then on the Guyandotte of Cabell County, where the household was enumerated as "Benj<sup>n</sup> H. White," aged 45+, with a female in the same age group, two females 16–26, one male 16–18, one male and one female 10–16, and four males and one female 0–10.<sup>44</sup> (Considering that Benjamin H. and Ann married in 1787, Ann may not have been the mother of all of the five children 0–10.) On 28 September 1824, as "Benjamin H. White," he made a cameo appearance in Giles when a court minute ordered payment to him for "attendance and mileage as a witness for the Com'th vs. Allen Christian." In August 1827, when the land speculator James Hector and wife cleared the title to thirty-four tracts of land in Giles, Tazewell, and Monroe Counties, the deed included "Benjamin White" among Brush Creek farmers James White (his proposed son), Thomas White and Isaac White (proposed sons of John Sr. by Frankey), and David Mills (Frankey's eldest grandson, by her son Samuel). Benjamin, however, was not concurrently taxed on the personal rolls of Giles, suggesting that he continued to live outside Giles while a relative (likely a son) occupied his land.

In 1824, Benjamin's part of Cabell County was cut away for the new county of Logan. The last record found to date for him is Logan's 1830 census. Aged 60–70, Benjamin was enumerated with a female 50–60, two males and two females 20–30, a female 15–20, and another 10–15.<sup>47</sup> The 1850 census enumerates "Nancy White, aged 92" (more likely 80–82) adjacent to the household of her youngest son Micajah in Boone County (created 1847 from Logan, Cabell, and Kanawha).<sup>48</sup>

Known records suggest identities for nine children born to Benjamin H. White and Ann Goodwin:

- o *Editha White* or her 1816 husband *William White* (William R. White on 1828 and 1829 tax rolls). This William born *c*1793–94 according to the 1850 census (Giles, stamped p. 153 *verso*), first appeared on the tax roll in his own name, 1815. He married *Editha White* by bond dated 2 December 1816.<sup>49</sup> He appears on the *Giles 1830* census (p. 238) as a male 30–40, with a female in the same age group, a male and female aged 10–15, 2 males and 1 female aged 5–10, and 3 females aged 0–10. The *1840 Mercer* Co. census (p. 11, line 6) enumerates him adjacent to his proposed brother Cornelius. I have not tracked the couple past the *1850 Mercer* census (p. 153*v*, fam. 343), at which time William and Editha were enumerated together. The evidence is ambiguous as to whether Benjamin was the father of Editha or William. See the discussion in the chronological notes section of this paper, under their December 1816 marriage record.
- Cornelius "Neely" White, born 10 June 1793 according to undocumented online trees (the 1850–70 censuses suggest 1792–93),<sup>50</sup> appointed constable in Giles in 1815.<sup>51</sup> He wed Mary "Polly" Garrison by bond dated 25 May 1816<sup>52</sup> and settled amid her family on Harman's Branch of East River. He appears on the 1840 Mercer census (p. 11) adjacent to proposed brother William (lines 6 and 7) with putative son William G. at line 4 and Mickey White (widow of Cornelius' proposed brother James) at line 19. Also 1850 Mercer (p. 194, family 631), aged 57, adjacent to William G., aged 34; 1860 Mercer (p. 71, family 459), aged 67; and 1870 Mercer (p. 12, family 81), aged 77 with wife Mary, living one house from Thomas White, 66.
- Sally White, born c1795, married William Cooper by bond dated 6 November 1818, at which time she presented no parental permission, suggesting that she was already 21.<sup>53</sup>
- James White, born c1796, who first came on the tax roll in his own name in 1817, but then appears to have reverted back to Benjamin's tax list until his 1821 marriage (by bond dated 2 June 1821)<sup>54</sup> to Meeky McKinney. James died late 1827 or early 1828 on his Brush Creek/Five Mile Creek farm,<sup>55</sup> leaving three small children, Eleanor, Priscilla, and James.<sup>56</sup>
- (Possibly) Mary White, b. c1797–1800, who is enumerated four households from Benjamin W. White in Logan County 1840 (p. 3, line 7), aged 30–40 with a male 20–30 and a male 15–20. The 1860 Logan census cites her age as 63, and places her in a household headed by Wesley White, aged 32. Wesley's age is appropriate for him to be her son, named for her proposed brother Benjamin Wesley.
- John White, born c1798. He came onto the tax roll in his own name in 1819, the year that "John White Senr", William White, John White Jun", James White, and Samuel Mills" were among 34 small-scale landowners along East River Mountain, Giles County, whose land titles were cleared

by Christian Peters.<sup>57</sup> In 1821, the tax roll clustered him with John Sr. and James of Brush Creek; in 1822, after the passing of John Sr., he was again clustered with James. He dropped out in 1823–25, reappeared in 1826 with William (his proposed brother or brother-in-law) and Thomas (proposed son of John Sr.), and is last on record on 1827 tax roll of Giles, at which time he was still clustered with William and Thomas. He *might* be the "John White Jr." aged 30–40, enumerated in **1830 Logan** County (p. 286). That semi-alphabetical census places him in proximity to one John White Sr., a man who previously resided in Cabell. Given that the use of "Sr." and "Jr." in that era also denoted "older" and "younger," not just "father" and "son," the identities of these two 1830 Johns are ambiguous.

- Benjamin Wesley, b. c1801–2, who first appears in Giles County in 1824 as "Westley White," a guard for two prisoners. In August 1827, again as "Wesley White," he was one of 34 men of Giles, Tazewell, and Monroe Counties who received a title clearance for land bought from the speculator James Hector (others included Benjamin, James, Thomas, and Isaac White, and David Mills, son of Samuel). He has not been found on the census of 1830 but surfaced in 1840 Logan as "Benj. W. White," aged 30–40 with a young family (p. 3, line 23). He is enumerated in 1850 Logan as "Benjamin W. White," 48, with a wife Sarah and sons Benjamin H., 13, and Cornelius, 8. Also 1860 Logan, as "Wesley White," 58, again with wife Sarah and sons Benjamin H., 23, and Cornelius, 18. The naming patterns suggest a probability he was from the Benjamin branch of the family. Thorough research needs to be done on Wesley and all the Whites who were cut away into Logan and Mercer.
- o *Elizabeth*, mother of Evalina White by Charles A. Dingess.<sup>60</sup> See the Dingess discussion in "Research Notes," under November 1835, when his will was probated and his property sold.
- Micajah G. (said to be Micajah Goodwin, the name of Ann Goodwin's father), b. c1810–12, who appears on the 1840 Logan census (p. 7, line 11). He is cited on the 1850 Boone Co., VA, census as aged 40, wife Matilda (Workman, allegedly) with a son Benjamin. He appears again on the 1860 Boone census as aged 48, born in Giles, with children born in Logan and a wife born in Kanawha. The naming pattern is appropriate for him to be assigned to the Benjamin branch of this family.

The 1810–30 censuses suggest the existence of other children, particularly unidentified daughters.

4. ROBERT WHITE, b. before 1773, first appeared on the personal tax roll in 1794. He married Mary Webb by bond dated 23 May 1795. In 1796, he submitted his list on the same day and in same district as Thomas Copley Jr. who had served as bondsman for John White Sr. to marry Frankey Mills (and whose sister, Nancy Copley, had married John White Jr.). The 1797 and 1798 rolls of that district include him as a tithable. In 1797 he sold Randall Lucas his occupancy rights to land on the north side of Salt Pond Mountain but did not deliver a title and was sued in 1805 by an assignee of Lucas. 62

A 1796 survey for Lucas named **John White** [Jr.] as an adjacent landholder, rather than Robert;<sup>63</sup> and the 1812 tax roll places **James White** as adjacent landowner to Randall Lucas at Salt Pond Mountain. This location for the land attributed to Robert, John Jr., and James—correlated with their ages—suggests they were likely brothers. Robert has not been found in the subsequent records of Montgomery, Giles, or their offshoots, although the law suit launched against him in 1805 was continued until 1819, at which time it was abated by the *plaintiff's* death. It would appear that Robert had left the region.

5. JAMES WHITE ("JAMES WHITE H" on 1817 tax roll), born before 1775 (according to 1820 census) was first named on the personal-tax roll in 1799 amid settlers of the Salt Pond Mountain and Doe Creek area. He signed the 1800 petition consecutively with John Sr. and Jr., Benjamin, and Arthur White. After a six-year hiatus from the tax rolls, he reappeared in 1806 and did jury service the same year. He entered land 1808 and 1809 on Salt Pond Mountain and purchased a third tract there in 1810. In 1807 he and "John White" [Jr.] were charged with fighting Caleb and William Stowers; and in 1809, he and John White Jr. were sued by Philip Miller, at which time John White Sr. acted as their "special bail." In 1811, Miller sued not only John Jr. and Sr. but also Benjamin H. White. Those actions suggest the likelihood that James, John Jr. (aka John H.), and Benjamin H. were brothers, all sons of the older John. (That "H" was also appended to this James's name by the tax assessor in 1817.)

No marriage record has been found for James of Salt Pond/Doe Creek; no known record names a wife until 1843, when then-wife Mary joined him in selling land to two of his sons. <sup>67</sup> James's first son reached tithable age in 1818 (i.e., born before 1802), suggesting a parental marriage in 1801 or earlier. Tax roll clusters, for the rolls that have been read up to this point, suggest that James's sons were *Adam M.* and *Jacob* (first taxed under their own names in 1823), *Isaac and Reubin F.* (first named on 1831 roll), and *Levi* (first named on 1834 roll). An 1843 deed names younger sons *Preston C. White* and *James White Jr.* Tax-roll and census clusters also suggest James fathered *Susan White*, supposedly born 8 September 1804, who married Jeremiah Williams on 31 August 1826 and *Jemima White* who married Tobias Williams in July 1835. <sup>68</sup>

# LIKELY SONS OF JOHN WHITE SR. BY FRANCES "FRANKEY" MILLS:

6. THOMAS WHITE, born 1803–4, according to 1850–70 censuses. He appears to be one of the two young tithables in the household of John Sr. in 1821, the last tax roll that included John Sr. In 1822–25 the tax rolls cluster him with James White and William White of Brush Creek (proposed sons, or son and son-in-law of Benjamin). The 1827 roll clusters him again with James, William, and the newly taxed Reuben (Thomas's proposed brother). In August 1827, he was one of thirty-nine men of Giles, Tazewell, and Monroe Counties who received a title clearance for land they had purchased from the speculator James Hector. Others included Benjamin White, James and Wesley White

(proposed sons of Benjamin), Reuben and Isaac White (proposed sons of John Sr.), and David Mills, son of Samuel.<sup>69</sup>

After James' death in 1827–28, Thomas remained with William on the lists of 1828–30, with Reuben in 1831, and with both William and Reuben in 1833. He attended the June 1828 estate sale of James White's property (Cornelius and William White, administrators), in company with his proposed brother Reuben White, their proposed half-brother Samuel Mills, and Samuel's son David. The **1830 Giles** census (p. 237) enumerates Thomas's household adjacent to Reuben, citing him as a male 20–30, with a female in the same age group, 1 male 0–5 and 1 female 0–5, implying that he married about 1825. The **1850 Mercer** census (stamped p. 174, fam. 349) cites him as age 45, with an **apparent wife Polly** and children **Reuben, Milton, Benton, Lucinda**, and **Susan**, aged 19 down to 10, living next door to "Harman" (or Hamman), aged 24, and four houses from "Patten G." White, 27—both likely to be his sons. He has not been found on the 1860 census but reappears on the **1870 Mercer** Co. census, aged 66, with Rebecca aged 32, John L. W. aged 1, and a P. S Blankenship aged 4; there, they are enumerated one household from Cornelius (p. 12, families 81 and 83).

- 7. **REUBEN WHITE**, b. about 1805, he appears to be one of the two young tithes still charged to John Sr. on the latter's last tax roll (1821). He married **Mary Fannon** by bond dated 23 May 1827.<sup>71</sup> In 1828 he attended the estate sale of James White on Brush Creek with his Cornelius and William White (brothers or brother and brother-in-law of James), his proposed full-brother Thomas White, his proposed half-brother Samuel Mills, and the latter's son David.<sup>72</sup> The **1830 Giles** census enumerates him next to Thomas White, with a female in the same age group, and a male and female aged 0–5. In 1836, with Thomas White and Samuel Mills, he attended the estate sale of Charles A. Dingess of Brush Creek, whose will left a bequest to a child Dingess apparently fathered by Elizabeth White (proposed daughter of Benjamin).<sup>73</sup> In **1840 Mercer** Co. (p. 11, line 20), he was enumerated adjacent to James White's widow Mickey White and 13–14 houses from James' proposed brother Cornelius and William White. It is obvious that, even though county lines changed, these individuals remained in the same neighborhood across their adulthood.
- 8. ?WILLIAM WHITE, b. about 1806, has been found only once in Giles County records. The 1827 tax roll cites a second William in the same cluster with the William White who married Editha in 1815. John Sr.'s household of 1810 included otherwise unidentified males in his age bracket; Benjamin H.'s household did not. However, the fact that this appears only once on these rolls suggest the possibility of a copying error or else a member of the Cabell > Logan Whites who temporary moved across the county line (as James White of the Guyandotte did at the time of the 1821 tax roll).<sup>74</sup>
- 9. **ISAAC WHITE,** b. about 1807–10, has been found only once in Giles County records. In August 1827, he was one of 34 men receiving a title clearance for land obtained from the speculator James Hector;

others included Benjamin, James, and Wesley White (apparent sons of Benjamin Sr.), Thomas White (his proposed brother), and David Mills (son of his proposed half-brother Samuel Mills).<sup>75</sup>

At least four other males apparently were born to John Sr. and Frankey, given the 1810 census data that credits them with eight young males and the number of underaged tithables charged to John Sr. in the 18-teens. No indication has been found for the identities of the older sons and tithables.

## CHILDREN OF FRANCES "FRANKEY" MILLS:

A. **RACHEL MILLS**, b. c1783–86.<sup>76</sup> On 7 September 1790, the Montgomery County Court ordered that she ("a daughter of Frankey Mills") be bound out by John Preston, overseer of the poor.<sup>77</sup> On 3 August 1803, she appeared before the county clerk to choose William Preston as her guardian,<sup>78</sup> a legality required because she was still a minor and, that day, **John Bowen** was requesting a license to marry her. After Preston was appointed her guardian and gave his consent, he then served as surety for the marriage bond.<sup>79</sup>

Before 1810 Rachel and John moved to Warren County, OH, where he died 8 February 1814, leaving children who are identified in Bible fragments<sup>80</sup> as *Hugh* (b. 19 March 1804), *Elizabeth* (b. 23 February 1806; possibly the Elizabeth who married JAMES MONCE 31 May 1828<sup>81</sup>), *James* (b. 18 January 1808; d. after witnessing Elizabeth's marriage permission), *Nancy* (b. 20 December 1809; m. 31 July 1826, JOHN BERRYHILL, with permission of "William Berryhill, Stepfather of said Nancy"<sup>82</sup>), *William Harrison* (b. 28 July 1812), *and John* (b. 7 August 1814; m. JEMIMA SMITH 11 February 1840, Warren Co., OH;<sup>83</sup> d. \_\_ February 1874).

The widowed Rachel (Mills) Bowen then married William Berryhill by whom she bore *Rachael* (b. 2 December 1817?; d. 2 August 1837), *Ruanah* (born 24 January 181 ; d. 8 January 1824),

*William* (b. 8 June 1820; possibly the William Berryhill who m. ROSANNA COCHRAN, 18 January 1844;<sup>84</sup> he or father d. 28 July 1842), *Joseph H (K?)* (b. 14 July 18\_\_), and *Mary* (b. 4 May \_\_\_\_\_; d. 28 August 1830). The William Berryhill household is enumerated on the 1820 and 1830 censuses of Warren County, Ohio; the John Bowen household of 1810 and the Berryhill household in 1840 and 1850 have not been located. As Rachel Berryhill she is enumerated in the 1860 home of her son John Bowen, in Lynchburg, Highland County, OH, where he was a prosperous "distiller," who had been enumerated there since 1850.<sup>85</sup>

B. **SAMUEL MILLS**, born c1788, married **Rachel Prince**, daughter of John and Rachel Prince about May 1807. The marriage bond and permission file includes the 23 April 1807 permission of Samuel's parents, "**John & Franky White**," who "both and each of us" gave permission for "our sun" to marry, the 29 April 1807 permission of Rachel's parents, and the 6 May 1807 bond. <sup>36</sup> Arthur White (see Hannah, above) served as Samuel's bondsman and a witness to the Prince permission. James White (see above) and Benjamin H. White (see above) witnessed the permission given by John and Frankey. Arthur White (see Hannah above) was a surety on the bond as well as a witness to the Prince permission. Rachel died after the 1830 census; and Samuel married (2) *c*20 September 1833, Giles, **Nancy Rinehart** (b. *c1798*; d. 13 October 1881, Mercer Co., WV). <sup>87</sup> Samuel died 17 February 1859 in Mercer (then Virginia). <sup>88</sup>

Prior researchers report no evidence identifying Samuel's father. A Y-DNA test by one descendant matches him to male-line descendants of **Booker Mullin**s of Franklin County and the **Atkins/Adkins** males of Montgomery and Giles Counties. This descendant has not published his DNA data; therefore, privacy requires that he not be identified. I am including this note as a clue for others to follow—and to encourage testing and verification by other Y-line descendants of Samuel Mills.




Map 1

#### -RESEARCH NOTES-

#### **Technical Note:**

The tax notes that are included in this data summary adhere to two standard conventions:

- When a name is followed by a descriptor in *parentheses*, such as "White, John (Bear Spr)" those parentheses and its detail appear on the original roll, used by the tax commissioner to distinguish between same-name men.
- When a name is followed by a descriptor in square editorial brackets, such as "White, James
  [East River]," the notation within the brackets is locational or identifying detail I have added,
  based on prior entries for that cluster of names and land records reported in my previously
  cited Giles report.

# 1780 MONTGOMERY (LATER GILES) COUNTY, VA

Historical context

"John Toney, came in 1780, settled at the mouth of the East River and found the graves and the remains of a decayed log cabin. In that same year, **Benjamin White and John White** came from **Amherst County** and settled on **Sugar Run**, the waters of **Walker's Creek.** John remained in that area his long life, and died in 1847 at 83 years of age. Benjamin moved to the area that became Logan County [Kanawha until 1809, Cabell until 1824] and died in 1848/9."92

#### **COMMENT:**

The author does not cite his source(s) for the statements that Toney and the Whites came in 1780 and that the Whites came from Amherst. As detailed below, this brief blurb has serious problems.

- The author conflates three different John Whites, as well as the Benjamins associated with each of them. The John who died in 1847 was not the original John White who allegedly came in 1780 and he was not the John White whose land lay on Sugar Creek. We now have enough data to disambiguate the three Johns as follows:
  - 1. John Sr., the subject of this paper, was the family head who first appeared on the petition of 1787 as "John White Sr.," signing with "John White Jr.," "Beniman [Benjaman] White" and the Copleys who would become inlaws and associates. Tax rolls of Montgomery Co. do not include this trio again until 1792. John Sr. married Frankey Mills there in August, John Jr. married Nancy Copley in June 1793, and all were taxed on the 1793 roll. They would be taxed intermittently, in various combinations until 1797; and all were taxed most years thereafter. John Sr. and Benjamin would establish their families along Wolf Creek and East River.
  - 2. **John Jr.** (aka "John Jr.," "John White H," "John White, hunter," "John Hunter White," "John H White," and "Jack White") was the John who died in 1847, as subsequently seen under 1847 below. His will named his wife Nancy—i.e., **Nancy Copley**, whom John maried in January 1793, five months after John White "Sr." married Frankey Mills with Thomas Copley

Jr. as bondsman. As an adult, John first staked out land on **Doe Creek** (with Robert White and James White, his apparent brothers), then **Camping Hollow** (with the Copleys), before settling his family at **Bear Spring**.

- 3. John 'S' White was an early landowner along Little Sugar Run of Walker's Creek. He and a second Benjamin (but not a John Jr.) signed the same 1787 petition signed by John Sr., John Jr., and "Beniman." However, the Sugar Run man signed amid his Sugar Run/Walker's Creek neighbors. He was taxed on the personal-property roll from 1787 through 1794, then once more in 1796. He dropped off the roll after his 1796 marriage to Susannah Marcum. He appears to be the same John White who surfaced on the first tax roll of Cabell County in 1809 with a Benjamin White who was not the Benjamin of Wolf Creek and East River. Modern Whites who claim descent from John White and Susannah Marcum place them in Cabell County—a county I have not yet studied in depth.
- John Toney, who was an associate of Benjamin White, first appears in Montgomery County records as a juryman in April 1790. Over the next quarter century he developed an extensive enterprise in present Giles County—a plantation, mill, ferry, inn, and store—along New River between East River on the north and Wolf Creek on the South. Between 1804 and 1819 he bought land from, sued, owned land adjacent to, and co-witnessed documents with Benjamin White of Wolf Creek, East River, and Brush Creek—a man who, in 1807, adopted the middle initial "H." Aside from Toney's association with the Whites, he is of interest to this study because, on 15 April 1816 and again on 15 April 1817, he executed leases for two tracts of his land, with the witness to both documents being William Mills of Franklin County (b. c1783), a potential son of Frankey (Mills) White.
- **Benjamin White,** who is said to have moved to Kanawha, does not appear on the 1792–1811 tax rolls of Kanawha County.
- One **Samuel White** was taxed in Kanawha from 1793–1811 (possibly the Samuel found on earlier tax rolls of Fluvanna County). A **Joseph White** was also in Kanawha on the 1802 tax roll.
- One John White, on 22 July 1788 received a patent to 500 acres on Cole River in Montgomery County, soon to be Kanawha, land obtained from one John Smith and previously surveyed on 1 August 1787.<sup>94</sup> This John White has not been identified, although the fact that John Toney's ginseng camp was also on Cole River, and that John Toney also obtained his land there from John Smith,<sup>95</sup> suggests that the John White of Cole River *might* be the same John whose family were Toney associates in Giles.

#### COMMENT:

- The White-Marcum-Muncey-Cloyd-Marr (Mairs) and Patton neighborhood is the Walker Creek/Sugar Run neighborhood in which John 'S' White married Susannah Marcum in 1796.
- This Montgomery County tax list also included a William White and a James White who were a hundred or more miles from the two John Whites who signed the 1787 petition. No connection has been found between the Whites of Sugar Run and East River and those other two Whites.<sup>97</sup>

#### COMMENT:

- Aside from the first page of the petition, none of the signatures appear to be original. All subsequent pages represent a neat transcription apparently made for legislative purposes.
- Milliton Adkins was bondsman for the November 1788 marriage bond of John Abram Glymph and "widow" Frankey Mills.
- Note that the John Sr., John Jr., and "Benamin" White cluster on image 3 signed amid Copleys. Given that Thomas Copley Jr. would be surety for the marriage bond of John White Sr. to Frankey Mills and that John Jr. subsequently married the daughter of Thomas Copley Sr., these three signatures should represent the men who would become Copley in-laws.
- The John White who signed with the Farleys would logically be the Farley neighbor on Sugar Run: herein called John 'S' White.

# 19 JANUARY 1788 MONTGOMERY COUNTY, VA

Community context.

"Abram Glimps—100 acres on Doe Creek joining John Young and Michael Madden." 100

# COMMENT:

- Doe Creek, the site of Franky's first suitor ("Glimps" and "Glymph"), lay across New River from Walker Creek. It flowed just south of Little Stony Creek, the location of Elijah Sartain/Certain who in 1791 married Sarah Mills in Montgomery Co.<sup>101</sup> Both the White-Mills marriage and the Sartain-Mills marriage were performed by the Rev. Alexander Ross of Walker Creek Baptist Church.
- The James White who was cited as "James White H" on the 1817 tax list (proposed son of John Sr.) witnessed the marriage bond of Frankey's son **Samuel Mills** about the time he (James) settled at Doe Creek.
- "John Abram Glimp" was in 1785 a resident of Fluvanna County, where he and one William Priddy were sued in the October term by Anthony Haden, Executor of the will of Joseph

Hopkins, decd.<sup>102</sup> By August 1786 Glimp had left Fluvanna and the case was continued against Priddy alone.<sup>103</sup>

• The Napiers of Montgomery Co., from whom John 'S' White bought his Sugar Run property, were also rooted in Fluvanna, Amherst, and Albemarle. In Fluvanna, they were associates of Thomas Tilman Sr., whose daughter Lucy Tilman married **Jesse Mills** of Albemarle > Amherst in 1766. One of Jesse and Lucy's daughters was the **Sarah Mills** who arrived in Montgomery as a single mother about the same time as Frankey Mills.<sup>104</sup>

# 4 APRIL 1788 MONTGOMERY COUNTY, VA

Court order

"It appearing to the Court that there was no list of Tithables delivered to the Sheriff for the year 1782, 83, & 84 as the law directs so the Levies were collected from some while others were clear, whereby an Executive County Levee was found necessary to discharge the existing Claims against the County for the year 1787 which were running on Interest. It is therefore ordered that the Clerk shall make of an account Specifying the amount off the Claims against the County for the several years before mentioned & the returns of the money Collected by the Sheriff & that the Capt. of each Company should make up a List of the receipts given by the sheriffs for the Different years & present the Same to the July Court when a further order may be made." 105

### **COMMENT:**

This court order seems to say that the list attributed to "1782" Montgomery County by the state archives may be a partial, composite list covering several years.

# 22 JULY 1788

"With its Appurtenances to have and to hold the Said Tract or parcel of Land with its Appurtenances to the said John White and his Heirs forever. In witness whereof the said Edmund Randolph Esquire Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia hath hereunto Set my hand and Caused the lesser Seal of

the Said Commonwealth to be affixed at Richmond on" 22 July 1788 "and of the Commonwealth the Thirteenth [year]." 106

## **COMMENT:**

- Cole River (now Coal River) is a tributary of the Kanawa River, now flowing northward through western Kanawha Co.
- Big Cole/Coal River rises in Raleigh Co. from Clear Fork and Marsh Fork near Whiteville.
- Little Cole/Coal rises from Spruce Fork in present Logan Co. and Pond Fork in present Boone.
- While maps seem ambiguous for this period, it appears that Little Cole might have later fallen into extreme eastern Cabell near the point at which it was contiguous to Giles. Additional maps need to be sought on my next trip to Library of Virginia.

Both Big and Little Cole River lay in Montgomery prior to 1789 when Kanawha was created.

**John Toney,** a long-time associate of the John-Benjamin White cluster of East River, also received a grant on Cole River, as **assignee of Smith**, Treasury Warrant no. 18750 issued 14 August **1783**, being 344 acres **surveyed 7 March 1787**. <sup>108</sup>

#### COMMENT:

- The John White of this entry is John 'S' White of Sugar Run. The reconstructed list of all entries turned in for 21 March 1789 included his 1788 neighbors. 109
- The **Benjamin White** taxed on this list *appears* to be in the Wolf Creek to East River neighborhood two days removed from John White of Sugar Run. The following identifies all others who submitted their lists the same day as Benjamin:

• The dates and proved locations of the taxpayers suggest that on 17 March, the commissioner visited the Sugar Run area. The following day he was in the area of John Toney at the juncture of East River and Wolf Creek with New River. On 19 March he moved westward to pick up Benjamin White's community.

# 9 NOVEMBER 1788 MONTGOMERY COUNTY, VA

Marriage Bond

"Know all men by these presents that we **John A Glimph & Milliton Atkins** are held & firmly bound unto his Excellency the Governor for the time being & his Successors in the just & full sum of £50 Current Money to the which pay<sup>t</sup> well & truly to be made, we bind ourselves our Heirs &c Jointly & Severally & firmly by these presents as witness to our hands & seals this 9<sup>th</sup> day Nov<sup>r</sup> 1788. The Condition of the above obligation is Such that whereas the above bound John A Glimph hath this day obtained license for his marriage with **Fawney [Farney?] Mills**, a widow of this County. Now if there should be no loegal cause to obstruct the s<sup>d</sup> marriage, then the above obligation to be void or else to remain in full force. [SIgned] Militon Atkins for John [his mark] a Glimph, Milliton Atkins. Test: Abram Trigg." 110

#### COMMENT:

A published version of Montgomery County marriages renders the names differently: "Glimp, John A., and **Frankey Mills, widow.** Milliton *Akers,* surety—Nov. 9, 1788." <sup>111</sup>

This published volume has no index. It arranges marriages by the surname of the groom and probate data by the name of the deceased. I have read every entry throughout the volume in search of relevant names that are embedded and unindexed.



The actual marriage bond (see below) identifies the surety as Milliton *Atkins*, rather than Akers. Atkins was a key figure of the Walker Creek Baptist Church. **Frankey ("Fawney" in the bond) Mills did not marry Glimp.** He removed to Newberry District, SC, and wed a different wife by whom he left many offspring.

Meanwhile, an 1807 marriage bond in Giles County, VA, for **Samuel Mills** to marry Rachel Prince, includes the permission of two sets of parents: "John & Franky White" and "John & Rachel Prince." Because Samuel was underage, his birth occurred no earlier than 1787. The 1850 census and the age he gave for himself, when he applied for bounty land in 1853 as a War of 1812 militiaman, place his birth at 1788. 113

#### COMMENT:

- This would be the John 'S' White whose Little Sugar Run land was patented to him in 1790.
- The two young tithes in John's household would appear to be the "John Jr." and "Benjamin" who were taxed with him in 1791. The fact that "Benj<sup>n</sup>" White signed the 1787 Montgomery County petition with him, but John Jr. didn't, suggests that Benjamin was the oldest. Note that the 1788 list charged John of Sugar Run with one male 16–21, while another male (ostensibly John Jr.) reached 16 before this 1789 list was compiled.
- The Whitts (Rev. Richard, son Archibald, and nephew Jesse) are also in this district.

Regarding **Booker Mullins**, a close neighbor of Glimp who had taken out the bond to marry Franky Mills in November 1788: In 1806, when William Mills (of the Whitt-Witt Y) first emerged as an adult on the 1806 tax roll of then-adjacent Franklin County, he was not inserted at the end of the roll, as commonplace for new additions. Instead, he was sandwiched between Samuel McCarroll (who also owned inherited land in Montgomery) and **Booker Mullins**.

John White Sr., who married Frankey in 1792, is not on this roll.

# 7 SEPTEMBER 1790 MONTGOMERY COUNTY, VA

"Ordered that John Preston be appointed to bind out according to Law two poor children (to wit) David Lucus son of Prude Lucas and a daughter of Frankey Mills's and make return thereof." 115

#### COMMENT:

I have found nothing further on Prude Lucas. The Lucas family clustered around Doe Creek and Salt Pond Mountain where John White Jr. and Robert White appeared in the mid-1790s and where James White would settle thereafter.

Regarding the identity of this unnamed daughter of Frankey, three female candidates have been found in Montgomery and Giles:

#### Sarah Mills

Sarah married on 7 April 1791, without permission from a parent, guardian, or master—implying that she was already of full age (i.e., 21).<sup>116</sup> If so, then she would have been 21 or nearly so at the time that the court ordered the binding out of Frankey's "poor child." At 20, if Sarah were incapable of supporting herself, she would have been bound out as a poor woman under her own name, not as a nameless "child" of Frankey.

## Elizabeth Mills.

Elizabeth Mills married Archibald Chapman on 26 March 1811, at which time Sarah Mills's husband Elijah Sartain gave permission. Given that Elizabeth was under 21, her birth occurred after 26 March 1790. However,

- Frankey was not presented then to the court for bearing a baseborn child that needed to be bound out.<sup>118</sup> Her "daughter" is presented as a "poor child." The implication is that she was not a newborn.
- A comparison of the handling of this "poor child" against the 1785–88 handling of "Jane Busby's bastard child" also suggests that Frankey's daughter in 1790 was past the age to need a wet nurse.

# **Rachel Mills**

On 3 August 1803, in Montgomery County, John Bowen posted a bond to marry Rachel Mills. She was under underaged. On the day of the bond, the prominent William Preston (brother of John Preston who was ordered to bind out Frankey's child) asked the court to declare him the guardian of "Rachel Mills, orphan of Francis Mills." He then gave permission for her to marry and served as financial surety on the bond. No association has been found between Prestons and

As another corollary, on 2 October 1792 the court "Ordered that the Overseers of the poor bind out According to Law Sally a bastard Child of Catharine Lower aged Eight Years until she arrives to the age of Eighteen years unto Jacob Shell Senr." (6: 88).

John Bowen either before or after this bond. Extensive study of Millses in all surrounding counties—including Botetourt where the Prestons were also rooted—has not yielded evidence that Frankey belonged to any of those Millses.

Preston's role in Rachel's 1803 marriage suggests that she was a young woman bound to him or his family, who had no parents to give permission for her to marry—a circumstance fitting those known for Frankey Mills. As comparable examples, see the situations of two apparent sisters of the Sarah Mills discussed above:

- Elizabeth Mills, who married William Burton in Bedford Co. in 1786, used for "permission" an affidavit by the prominent George Lambert who said the young woman had asked him to write it for her to attest that she was of age.
- Susannah Mills who married in Amherst in 1795, used an attestation of age by John Lancaster who swore that Susannah was a daughter of Jesse Mills who had lived in his household for some years.<sup>119</sup>

Subsequent court orders presented in this report demonstrate that children were bound out until they came of age. If the Rachel Mills who married in 1803 was the bound-out daughter of Frankey, then it is likely that she had turned eighteen—i.e., born *c*1785. This fits the birth pattern for the two (and possibly three) Mills-surnamed children Frankey bore:

- William Mills (with a Whitt/Witt Y), born c1783; a hypothetical son;
- Rachel Mills, born c1785; and
- Samuel Mills (with an Adkins/Booker Mullins Y), born c1787; a proved son.

This analysis and conclusion—insofar as Rachel is concerned—is supported by the court order of 3 August 1803 (see that date below) which notes that "Rachel Mills, *orphan* of Franc<u>is Mills," came into court and chose William Preston as her guardian.</u>

#### Also consider:

- This court order referencing Frankey's daughter as a "poor child" rather than a "bastard" is consistent with her presenting herself as a widow at the time of the November 1788 marriage bond with John Abram Glymph.
- The fact that no Mills males have been found in the county who might be Frankey's deceased husband suggests that she arrived in the county with young children, rather than having borne those children in Montgomery County itself where her pregnancy and lack of husband would have been observed and reported to the overseers of the poor.
- Unlike some of the other binding-out cases presented in the contemporary court orders extracted into this report, there was no subsequent order by which the court authorized binding out this daughter to any specific person. (Caveat: court minutes seem to be missing from June 1791 until June 1792.)

# BEFORE 10 NOVEMBER 1790 MONTGOMERY COUNTY, VA [LATER GILES]

**John White** had Walker Creek/ Little Sugar Run land surveyed *prior to* this date. A 10 November 1790 survey for Gordon Cloyd, for 540 acres "on the **North side** of **Walkers Creek** on the head of **Little Sugar**

This is John 'S' White whose land adjoined the Napiers from Albemarle and Fluvanna Counties.

White." Shannon's survey twice mentions landmarks on John White's property:

Beginning at a white oak Corner to **John Whites land, now the head of a spring**, N 49° E 6 poles to a white oak and poplar, S 20° E 24 poles to a white oak in a hollow, S 41° E 34 poles to two white oaks, S 20° W 80 Poles to a Chesnut and Black oak, S 62° W 50 Poles to a white oak on the SE side of a hill, N 78° W 36 Poles to a Black oak, N 17° E 72 Poles to a Chesnut on a ridge, N 10° E 20 Poles to a Black oak and Chesnut oak on the N side of a hill, N 30° E 54 Poles to a Black oak Corner to **Joseph Cloyd's land** and with a line thereof N 18° W 14 Poles to two white oak saplings on said line, N 25° E 14 Poles to two white saplings on **Whites** line, S 38° W 30 Poles to the Beginning." 122

Again, this is John 'S' White, not John White Sr.

#### COMMENT:

Several factors argue that this is the John White family of Little Sugar Run of Walker Creek, from which "John White, his S mark" married the daughter of John Marcum (Markham) in 1796—not the John White who married Frankey Mills as "John White Sr." In brief:

• The Benjamin White who submitted his lists on the same day as John "Senr." and "Junr." would not be the Benjamin coupled in subsequent records with Frankey's John Sr. and his

apparent son John Jr. That Benjamin, who married Ann Goodwin in Albemarle in 1787, is taxed in Albemarle in the Goodwin neighborhood of Albemarle in 1790, 1791, and 1792.

- On the entries above, the dates place this "John Senr., John Junr., and Benjamin" cluster two days from the neighborhood of John and William Toney, the Wolf Creek/East River associates of the John Sr./Benjamin White family into which Frankey Mills married.
- The individuals whose tax lists were collected the same day as the three Whites of 1791 were residents of the Walker Creek/ Little Sugar Run community:
- Thomas Copley, whose son would serve as bondsman for the marriage of Frankey Mills to "John White Sr." in August 1792 (and whose daughter Nancy would marry John White Jr. in January 1793) turned in his list on 23 December.

Hath this day obtained License for his marriage with **Frances Mills** of full age of this County now if there should be no legal cause to obstruct the the [*sic*] said marriage then the above obligation to be void. [Signed:] John White, Thomas Copley."<sup>123</sup>


#### COMMENT:

As seen on the image below, the John White signature carries the ornate "LS" scroll that represented a legal signature. It does not carry a mark—i.e., the distinguishing characteristic of John White of (a) the 1793 sales of land on Little Sugar Run; and (b) the 1796 bond to marry Susanna Marcum. The signature on this 1792 bond, however, may or may not have been penned for John by Copley; it definitely was not penned by the scribe.

Worrell's abstracted marriages for Montgomery errs significantly in reporting this marriage. White is said by her to be John "Jr." and Copley is not identified as Thomas **Jr.** <sup>124</sup>



Cluster 1: John 'S' White and Robert Whitt:

- John White of Sugar Run, identified by the cluster of neighbors who turned in lists the same day (21 August): James Boon, George & David Calwell. Thomas Farley Sr. & Jr., William & Henry Farley, 127 Reuben Huse, James & Robert Karr.
- Robert Whitt married Mary White, daughter of "John White" 1? July 1793.<sup>128</sup> Whitt genealogies present him as the "consensus" nephew of Rev. Richard Whitt whose lands lay on Meadow Creek and Little River of New River.<sup>129</sup>
- No known record identifies which John White was the father of Mary. However, Robert Whitt
  drops from Montgomery County tax rolls simultaneously with the John White cluster of Sugar
  Run. When Robert Whitt applied for a pension from Logan County in 1833, Low Brown of the
  Walker Creek / Sugar Run community (then a resident of Tazewell County) filed an affidavit for
  Whitt. No record found to date couples Robert and Mary (White) Whitt with the John White
  cluster into which Frankey Mills married.

## Cluster 2: John White Sr. and Robert White:

- Robert White & John White [Sr.] of 17 October, whose lists were collected the same day as the Toneys and others in the Wolf Creek to East River area. (See list below.)
- No Robert White appears on any subsequent tax list in the area that became Giles.<sup>131</sup> In 1795, Montgomery, he posted bond to marry **Mary Webb**, daughter of William Webb.<sup>132</sup> About 1805 **Robert** was sued by William McClennihan stating that on 15 August 1797, Robert had contracted to sell to **Randal Lucas** for 150£ 150 acres on **north side of Salt Pond Mountain** adjoining Lucas and *Thomas Cassiday*, after which Lucas sold the land to Benjamin Thomas, who had sold the "obligation" to McClennihan. Meanwhile, Robert White had never made out to any of them a title to the land.<sup>133</sup> In 1806, a patent to Lucas stated that his land, at the head of Doe Creek, adjoined *Thomas Cassiday* and "John White" (later identified as John White Jr. and John White H, the man who married Nancy Copley in 1793).<sup>134</sup> In 1810, James White (who was first taxed in 1799, was married by 1802, and taxed in 1817 as James White H) bought land between Doe Creek and Salt Pond Mountain, adjacent to *Thomas Cassiday*).<sup>135</sup>

- The geographic clustering suggests that these three Whites of Doe Creek / Salt Pond were part of the same family. The ages of these men suggest they were sons of John Sr.
- The fact that John Sr. married Frankey in August of this year (while John Jr. did not marry Nancy Copley until June 1793) suggests that John Sr. was likely the man taxed here in 1792.
- The identities and landholdings of the men who were taxed with Robert and John White in this year suggests that Robert and John were in the area between Wolf Creek and East River—the location in which John Sr. and Frankey settled by 1797.
- All the presently known facts suggest that Robert and John Jr. first staked their claim to the Doe Creek land between 1792 and 1795.







### **COMMENT:**

This time the county clerk's "replication" of John's mark is significantly different from the 'S' of the prior two documents and the 'S' of the White-Marcum marriage bond. However, the description of the land unambiguously identifies this as the John 'S' White of Sugar Run.

Despite these three land sales, John would continue to be charged with all 130 acres on the tax rolls through 1806. In that year, his taxable acreage was dropped from 130 to 35. After that 1806 correction, he would be removed from the rolls of Montgomery and Giles.

Robert White and the still-unidentified Elexander White appear in Currin's district, with Elijah Sartain of Stoney Creek (across New River from Walker Creek) who married Sarah Mills in 1791. This location for Robert is consistent with the documents placing the land claim of Robert and John Jr. on Doe Creek.

No other "March" entries exist on the "W" list. However, on the "S" list, a sequence that begins "\_\_\_\_ 10, Jacob & Andrew Straley," and runs through the 29th of some month on the next page appears to be March listings. In the prior year, the Straleys submitted their lists on the same day as John Jr.

- This John White is "John White Sr.," husband of Frankey Mills. As seen in the 22 December 1796 note above, John Jr. (aka John Hunter White, husband of Nancy Copley) had already obtained rights to land at Doe Creek, east of New River, roughly opposite the point that Walker Creek emptied into New River.
- William Preston, in 1803, assumed guardianship of Frankey's "orphaned" daughter Rachel Mills for the purpose of providing legal permission for her marriage to John Bowen. Achel had been taken from Frankey in 1790 and bound out by John Preston on behalf of the overseers of the poor. That court order did not identify the family to whom Rachel was



- Both *HomeTownLocator* and *GNIS*—as well as Map 2 above—place "Big Spring" on East River at East River Mountain, in present Mercer County.
- See Maps 4 and 5. Also see notes dated 16 December 1801 for the patent and survey calls. The 1800 petition, extracted below, places all this White family "below Wolf Creek Mountain," including John Jr. In 1804, John Jr. left them and moved back to the Copley neighborhood.

Hannah White has not been identified with any degree of certainty. Evidence suggests she was likely a sister of John White Jr. and, therefore, a daughter of John White Sr. Several pieces of indirect evidence are relevant to this hypothesis:

- Jeremiah Williams, who turned in his list the same day as Hannah, is later clustered with other Whites, as follows:
  - 1797, he turned in his list on the same day as Robert White, whose 1797 land was said to be adjacent to Randall Lucas at Salt Pond Mountain. 148 In 1806, a survey of Randall Lucas's land said that it adjoined John White [Jr.]. In 1812, Giles' land entry book stated that Randall Lucas's land adjoined James White. 149 Name-coupling on both tax rolls and petitions suggests that John Jr. and James (like Benjamin) were sons of John Sr.
  - 1806, Jeremiah Williams turned in his list on the same day as Benjamin, John Sr., and John Jr. White.
- On the next year's tax roll (1799), Hannah is dropped and two new males appear on the

Montgomery tax roll: **John White** and **Arthur White.** Arthur (aka Arter) would in 1807 serve as a bondsman for the marriage of Samuel Mills, son of Frankey Mills and stepson of John Sr.

- The presence of two males 16–21 in Hannah's household in 1798 suggests that she was a widow or unmarried mother, at least in her mid-30s. If she were married to a brother of Benjamin, John Jr., Robert, and James, then that brother has not been identified. If she were their unmarried sister with two teenagers, then age-wise she should be older than Benjamin who married in 1787.
- The name Hannah White has been found in only one other instance—twenty-four years later. In April 1822, John White Jr. transferred 80 acres at Bear Spring to "Hannah White" for \$21.50½. 150 He was at that time jailed for debt. In an effort to save his property from creditors, he—on the same day that he transferred the 80 acres to Hannah—conveyed 65 acres on waters of Bear Spring and Buckeye Mountain to William White "for the good will and affection he bears toward his son." 151 Unlike the deed to William, the deed to Hannah does not state a relationship or include the "good will and affection" clause. The 1810 census does not attribute a female child to John's household, who might be this Hannah. The likeliest reading of this body of evidence is that she was an unmarried sister living near and being provided for by John Jr.

### 1798 MONTGOMERY COUNTY, VA

Land sale

Benjamin White (said here to have died before 1 September 1813) was a chain carrier for a survey of 105 acres that Gordon Cloyd made in 1798 for Thomas Cloyd "on the ridge dividing the waters of East river from those waters falling into Brush Creek. According to Cloyd, White "wished to possess himself of the said Survey and it was then agreed if the said Benjamin White Complied with the verbal bargain then made the said Cloyd would convey such right as might be required under the Survey then made but no responsibility of title other than a special warrantee from the said Gordon as whoever obtained the grant was to be given and whereas the said Benjamin White sold to James Copley who paid said Gordon the the [sic] Sum contracted by the said Benjamin White his claim and interest in & to the said Survey and the said James Copley informed the said Gordon that he had Sold his claim & Right therein to his brother Joshua Copley, who also informed the said Gordon that he had sold his right interest and claim in the survey aforesaid to Joseph McKenney ..." therefore, on 1 September 1813, Gordon Cloyd conveyed to McKinney the land that had been patented 16<sup>th</sup> of September 1802," adjoining Joseph Cloyd's inclusive survey of 680 acres [m & b not copied for want of time]. No witnesses shown. No proof in court. 152

### COMMENT:

• In short: this Benjamin White conveyed his claim to the land to James Copley, whose sister married John White Jr. (aka John H White). Thereafter, the claim went from James Copley to his brother Joshua, who passed it to their brother-in-law Joseph McKenney (husband of Elizabeth Copley). 153

- The alleged death of a Benjamin White before 1813 contradicts all other evidence I have found. Only one Benjamin White appears on the Montgomery and Giles tax rolls between 1792 and 1820—the Benjamin White who married Ann Goodwin, 10 July 1787, Amherst. <sup>154</sup> Given that General Cloyd's social and economic status would not suggest a close familiarity with the White family, it is possible that he erred—either speaking from rumor or as a dismissal to avoid a need to track Benjamin down to clear the title.
- James Copley was "special bail" for Benjamin H. White in 1809 when he was sued by John Toney, shortly before White's sale of his East River land to Toney. I did not find a deed from Benjamin to James Copley, quit-claiming his rights to the land.

- Again there is the taxation of 130 acres (the Sugar Run land) to John White, who no longer appears on the county's personal roll.
- Although land has been surveyed for John White [Sr.] and William Preston at Big Spring of East River Mountain, that land is not taxed because they do not yet have full title to it. (Even then, they would not be taxed on the land for another four years. The prevailing pattern seems to be no land tax until a new grantee has had time to clear the land and make it productive.)

"The Petition of Sundry Inhabitants of Montgomery County Resident on **New River below Wolf Creek Mountain** Humbly Represents That your Petitioners Occupy a Strip of the Said County, from the aforesaid Mountain To the Kanawa line about 70 Miles and Generally from 12 to 15 Miles in Width, Situated Between the Countys of Munroe and Tazewell ...", and as your Petitioners are generally Seated on the Banks of the New River, with Dispersed Settlements on its branches and the most Convenient of us to our Present Seat of Justice has to Travel thirty eight miles and Still the River to Pass—We therefore pray that your Honorable House will pass a law at your present Session to Incorporate us with the County of Munroe, by a Line to begin on New River at the end of Peters Mountain thence up the River so as to Include the Settlers on Wolf Creek, to Wolf Creek Mountain, thence with the Said Mountain, to

Again, the 95 acres surveyed for John Sr. and William Preston in 1797 at Big Spring on East River are not taxed, but this John continues to appear on the personal tax roll.

### **COMMENT:**

The roll of taxpayers who turned in their lists of taxable items on 24 May were the neighbors of the John White of Sugar Run / Walker Creek—suggesting that this "John Senr." is the Sugar Run man who was taxed as "John Senr." in 1791 with Benjamin and a younger John, but has been missing from Montgomery since his 1796 marriage to Susannah Marcum.

The appearance of Arter in this cluster is ambiguous. As previously discussed; he seems to have been one of the two underaged tithables charged to Hannah White in 1798, who was then taxed in his own name (together with a new John) in 1799, when Hannah was dropped. However, his

above coupling with the John of Sugar Run—considered together with the fact that he removed to the Cabell area where this Sugar Run family ended up—suggests that he belongs to the Sugar Run cluster. If so, then

- Arter's service as bondsman to Samuel Mills, son of Frankey, suggests that the two samenamed clusters of Whites are part of the same extended family.
- Arter's parentage is badly muddled. If Sugar Run John were his father, then Hannah of 1798 should not be his mother, given that the Sugar Run John married Susanna Marcum in 1796.

- John Sr. has settled on that Big Spring at East Mountain land, coowned with Preston, where he will remain until 1818.
- Benjamin is in the neighborhood of the Wolf Creek land (the next water course below East Mountain) which he would lose in 1808 amid a suit by John Toney.
- James has settled permanently in the Doe Creek & Salt Pond Mountain area east of New River, roughly across from the mouth of Walker Creek.
- John Jr. (husband of Nancy Copley) is still claiming the Doe Creek land at this point. Shortly, (and apparently as a result of Robert's disposal of their interest), he would buy land across the river in the Camping Hollow neighborhood of his Copley inlaws before eventually settling at Bear Spring and Gap Mountain, where he stayed until his death in 1847.
- John (apparent sibling of Arter) is missing this year but returned in 1802 at which time he was
  again coupled with Arter. The pair are missing in 1803 but appear 1804–1806, coupled each
  year. The 1806 roll would call this John "hunter," a descriptor also used periodically for John
  White Jr. After Giles split away in 1806, neither would appear on the Giles tax roll, although
  Arter made a cameo appearance in 1807 in the marriage records of Frankey's son Samuel
  Mills.

This John White, who first obtained a peddlar's license in Botetourt and then presented it in Montgomery for recording when he arrived there to peddle, should be a Botetourt resident.

#### COMMENT:

As seen in the Cloyd-to-McKinney document discussed under 1799 and 1813, James Copley left the Copley Ford (later Copley Ferry) area around Camping Hollow and relocated in the Brush Creek/ East River area.

As seen in various documents below, the Dingess family of East River were close to the Benjamin branch of this White family. "Benjamin H. White" witnessed the will of Peter Dingess Sr. in 1809. Subsequently, his apparent daughter Elizabeth bore a child to Peter's son Charles Dingess, a wealthy bachelor who left part of his estate to Elizabeth's daughter.

Beginning at four chesnuts on the S side of a Spur, S 38° E94 poles to two Spanish Oaks and a poplar by a branch, Corner of **George Paris's** land and with a line of the same S 65° E 60 poles to two white oaks, thence leaving said line S 40° W 170 poles to two white oaks in a hollow, N 45° W48 poles to three white oaks, thence N 10° E 200 poles, crossing some small branches to the beginning.

This John is the John Sr. who married Frankey Mills.

### **COMMENT:**

Rachel, as daughter of Frances Mills, was clearly not an "orphan" by modern definition. Frances was still alive in 1807 when her son Samuel married. However, in this time frame, the term "orphan of ..." was not commonly used in reference to a deceased mother. It was almost always used in reference to a deceased father—i.e., a child without the support or protection of a male parent. William Preston, a man exceptionally educated for his place and time, may have deliberated used the masculine spelling of Frances' name when he acted for Rachel *in locos parentis*, rather than have her go on record as a child born to a single mother. In this vein, it is also worth noting that when William Preston's brother John asked the court to bind out Frances'

daughter in 1790, he did not put the child's name into the record. Rachel's actual father has not been identified.

### COMMENT:

Note that Arter and John this year are two days away from the East River cluster. The pattern of the commissioner is this:

- On 5 April he collected lists from John Toney of New River at East River and others who lived a bit up East River.
- By 6 April, he has moved further up East River, to the Big Spring area where John Senr. and Frankey then lived.
- The 7 April lists (the day he picked up Robert White) included several living between East River and Wolf Creek, including Peter Dingess and Gabriel Maupin—also James Wiley, a man couple with John Sr.'s cluster in years past, and **John Connor.**

Connor is particularly important to this study; he would surface again in 1816–17, with Zachariah Crawford, *leasing land from John Toney with William Mills as witness to both leases*. An 1827 title clearance (see that year below) shows John Conner and Zachariah Crawford sharing a roughly three-square-mile area north of the Bluestone with several of John White Sr.'s offspring, as well as Samuel Mills's eldest son David. 166

### 7 DECEMBER 1804 MONTGOMERY COUNTY, VA

**James Whit[e]** [skip 4 to end of column]

Petition to Legislature

"Freeholders and Inhabitants of the County of Montgomery ... request to create new county "from parts of Montgomery, Tazewell, & Monroe." "The said County comprehended a large tract of Territory near one Hundred and eighty miles by forty or fifty Broad. ... [Because] of the Ferocious Disposition of the savage Nation then at arms and ravageing the Westren or frontier parts, the Settlements were [earlier] confin<sup>d</sup> to a small part of the Eastern end of the County. ... The emigration to those uninhabited part of the said County has so rapidly progressed since the Treaty with the Indian Tribes ... that some of [the settlers are] situated seventy, eighty and ninety miles Distance from the present Judicial seat of Justice, Large Mountains and water courses Intervening: At some seasons of the year [these] are almost impassiable by reason of which your Petetioners are almost Depriv<sup>d</sup> of the previledgeof Justice."

Thus, they seek "a New County off the western end of the said County of Montgomery including a small part of the Counties of Monroe and Tazewell ... to be constructed and Established by a Line Beginning on New River at end of Gaulley Mountain, where the Counties of Greenbrier Kanhawa and Montgomery intersects. Thence up the River with the Greenbrier and Montgomery Line to the intersection fo Monroe Line. Thence with Monroe and Montgomery Line to the mouth of Indian Creek, thence a strait Line to the Top of Peter Mountain where the path crosses from Jacob Millers on Rich Creek to Hatfields Mill on Stoney Creek. Thence along the Top of said Montain [sic] and with the Montgomery and Monroe Line to the Intersection of Botetourt County Line: and with the Botetourt and Montgomery line to the Top of the Gap Mountain. Thence along the Top of said Mountain to New River, crossing the same to the end of Walkers Creek Mountain. Thence along the Top of said Mountain to the intersection of Wythe County Line. Thence Northwestwardly with said line to the intersection of Tazewell Line: and with the Tazewell and Montgomery Line to the Top of Wolf Creek Mountain. Thence southwestwardly along the said Mountain to a point Two Miles below the mouth of the Clare fork of Wolf Creek, then a Strait Line to the head of east River called and Know[n] by the name of the Big Spring. Thence a Straight Line to the head of Crane Creek on the Top of the Flat Top Mountain. Thence a strait Line to the three forks of Guyandott River. Thence down said River until it intersects Kanhawa County line. Thence with the said Line to the Beginning, forming a County about one Hundred miles Long and about forty Broad, Leaving each of the Old Counties compact, without any reasonable cause for Removing the present Public Buildings."

### COMMENT:

Some of the "signatures" on this petition appear to be that of the named person. Most appear to be the handwriting of the person collecting the signatures. In the White grouping, confusion is evident. On the sixth line, apparently after stopping to refill



his ink pen, the collector wrote "White" with no given name. Then, after Patrick Napier Senior took the pen and signed on an upward slant, the collector or another individual, smudged out the surname-only White entry and he or someone else fitted in another William White signature—also on an upward slant that was uncharacteristic of the other signatures penned by the collector. Whether *two* William Whites appeared in that cluster remains questionable.

Notably, the tax rolls of Montgomery do not include *any* William White in 1804. *It would, in fact, be 1815 before any William White appeared on the tax roll.* This introduces a *possibility* that "William White" of this petition might be **William Mills**, proposed son of Frankey, using his stepfather's name before he left the family and went on his own.

"Be it enacted by the general assembly, That all the part of the counties of **Montgomery, Monroe and Tazewell,** contained within the following boundaries, to wit:

Beginning at the end of Gauly mountain on New river where the counties of Greenbriar and Kanawha intersect; thence up the river with the Greenbriar and Montgomery line to the intersection of Monroe line; thence with the Monroe and Montgomery line to the upper end of Pine's plantation; thence a straight line to the mouth of Rich creek, leaving the plantation of Hugh Caperton on the right; thence with the Montgomery and Monroe line to the intersection of Botetourt county line, and with the Botetourt and Montgomery line to the top of Gap mountain; thence along the top of said mountain to New river, crossing the same to the end of Walker's creek mountain; thence along the top of said mountain to the intersection of Wythe county line; thence north-westwardly with said line to the intersection of Tazewell line, and with the Tazewell and Montgomery line to the top of Wolf creek mountain; thence along Wolf creek mountain to a path leading from the Round Bottom to Harman's mill, about three miles below the mouth of Clear Fork of Wolf creek [current Bland Co. area]; thence a straight line to the Big Spring on East river; thence a straight line to the mouth of Militin's fork; thence a direct line to the head of Crane creek on the top of the Flat-top mountain; thence down said river until it intersects with Kanawha county line; thence with the said line to the beginning

shall, from and after the first day of May next, form one distinct county, and be called and known by the name of Giles county. ..."

"A court for the said county of Giles shall be held by the justices thereof on the second Tuesday in every month ... and a quarterly session of the said court shall be held in each of the months of April, June, September and November of every year. ..."

"The said county of Giles shall remain in the same district with the county of **Monroe**, for which district courts are holden at the Sweet springs, and be of the same brigade district." <sup>169</sup>

### 4 FEBUARY 1806 MONTGOMERY COUNTY, VA

Disambiguation

Court order: "John White to David Summers Deed proven by the oath of Gorden Cloyd & James Hoge and Continued for further proof." <sup>170</sup>

### COMMENT:

This conveyance has not been found in the clerk's record books for deeds. The fact that it was "continued for further proof" indicates all witnesses had not appeared in court to attest the validity of the document. When this situation occurred, if the missing witnesses did not eventually appear, the instrument would rarely be recorded.

Contradictory factors suggest that this John could be the (a) John Jr., husband of Nancy Copley, selling his land (or claim to land) adjacent to Randall Lucas on Doe Creek; or (b) John formerly of Sugar Run, selling off the remaining acreage that he retained after his three sales of 1793:

### Possibly John White Jr.:

- The identity of the purchaser (Summers) suggests that this John White was from the family of John White Sr. in the Wolf Creek to East River area. Summers in 1804 had witnessed Benjamin White Sr.'s purchase on Wolf Creek.<sup>171</sup>
- The identity of the witness (Cloyd) adds nothing pro or con. He owned land all over the county, held land adjacent to John of Little Sugar Creek, but also used Benjamin White as his chain bearer for land surveys on East River.<sup>172</sup>

### Possibly John 'S' White of Sugar Run:

- This year 1806 is the year that the Montgomery County land tax roll corrected its long-running error and reduced John White's Sugar Run tract to 35 acres. That tax-roll correction could have been prompted by the above sale.
- The fact that witnesses were called to attest the validity of the document, rather than the seller himself appearing in court to acknowledge the deed as his own act, also suggests that the seller is no longer in the county.

By virtue of two warrants (one for 65 acres by military warrant no. 330 issued 7 February 1780 under the royal proclamation of 1763; the other for 64 acres by Treasury Warrant no. 1022 issued 25 December 1794), there is granted to **Randall Lucas** a tract of 125 acres **surveyed 22 December 1796** in the county of Montgomery "on the head of **Doe Creek**, a branch of New River" bounded as follows:

Beginning at two large chestnuts corner of **John White's** land, then with a line thereof N 74° E 140 poles to a large chesnut, N 80 poles crossing a small branch to a black oak, N 78° W 178 poles to a buckeye in a branch, S 38° W 57 poles to a sugar tree on a sharp spur, S 20° E 44 poles to three sugar trees on a line of **Thomas Cassidays** land, then with lines thereon N 55° E 42 poles to two sugar trees by a branch, a corner thereof, and then S 16° 98 poles down said branch and crossing the same to the beginning. <sup>173</sup>

### **COMMENT:**

- Doe Creek was the previous location of the land of John Abram Glymph, the man Frankey almost married in November 1788.
- Note on Maps 1 and 2 that Doe Creek is east of New River, just below the mouth of Walker Creek the west of New River near Copley's Ford. Most references to John 'S' White's land place him several miles westward where Little Sugar Run approaches Walker's Creek.
- This John White is John White Jr., husband of Nancy Copley.
- The Lucas land also adjoined **Robert White** in 1797, according to a suit subsequently filed against Robert:

"To the Worshippful Court of Montgomery County in Chancery sitting humbly complaining hewethe [herewith] unto your Worships your Orator Wm. McClenanachan [sic], That on or about the fifteenth day of August in the year of our Lord 1797 a certain Robert White entered into an obligation (which your Orator prays may be referred to & taken as part of this bill) under the penalty of one hundred and fifty pounds to a certain Randal Lucas conditioned that the said White should make a good & Lawful right to a certain tract of Land containing one hundred & fifty Acres of Land lying & being on the north side of the Salt Pond Mountain, adjoining the lands of Thomas Cassiday & the land of Randal Lucas & is now also the plantation on which he now lives, to the said Randal Lucas ... . Afterwards on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of August 1797, the said Randal Lucas assigned the said obligation with all its force to Benjamin Thomas ..."174

### COMMENT:

- John Sr. should be one of the tithes in his own household, despite his age. In reading court minutes, I did not find a request by him to be excused from taxes.
- One of the two younger tithes in John's household should be his stepson, Samuel Mills
- The other young tithe would not be a son of John by Frankey. Any son by her would be four years shy of tithable age.
- One possibility for the extra tithe can be ruled out: John White Sr. was not in a financial position to employ a laborer.

- A second possibility: Frankey's hypothetical son William Mills who emerged this year in Franklin County, as an apparent employee of young Samuel McCarrell who had inherited Montgomery > Giles land belonging to his grandfather John Ferguson.
- One other possibility is unlikely: none of John's proposed sons had been married long enough to have a son of tithable age, with the possible exception of Benjamin. However, Benjamin's tax lists did not include an extra tithe for another two years.
- Re Robert Wilburn adjacent to Benjamin White: A road order of 1818 places Wilburn as a neighbor of Toney's Ferry, off East River.
- Arthur White's appearance at the end of the "W" list W is a typical position for new males at their first appearance—or for previously taxed males who had dropped out of the county and now returned.
- Note that John Sr. and Jr. are grouped together and submitted their list on the same day. This suggests that John Jr. had not yet moved to the land that was surveyed for him in the Copley neighborhood of Camping Creek, 1804.

- The second tithable in John Sr.'s household should be his stepson Samuel Mills who would marry about ten days later.
- John Sr. has lost a tithe since 1860—raising the question whether that tithe might have been Frankey's hypothetical son William Mills who in 1806 established himself in Franklin County, as an apparent employee of young Samuel McCarrell who had inherited Montgomery > Giles land belonging to his grandfather John Ferguson.
- James turned in his list on the same day as John Sr., implying that he was then living with John Sr. and working the Big Spring land with him.





### Also note:

• Frances "Frankey" Mills married "John White Sr." by bond of 19 August 1792, Montgomery County, with Thomas Copley Jr. as surety. Given that son Samuel is under 21, then he was born 1786–c1792. Social patterns suggest that the likeliest period of Samuel's birth was about the year that Abram Glymph took out the bond to marry "Widow" Frances Mills and then the planned marriage fell through for an unexplained reason (i.e., late 1787 to late 1788).

- Arthur ("Arter"), Benjamin H., and James White would not be sons of Frankey. A son of hers by John White Sr. would not be old enough to serve as official witnesses or bondsman.
- As previously noted, the only "Benjamin White" in Giles County, 1800–14, has been the Benjamin who married Ann Goodwin in 1787. This 1807 document marks the earliest usage of the middle initial 'H' that has been found for him, and the first time that he has signed a bond. He would use the middle initial H—almost without exception, but never a middle name—through the last document I've found for him (the 1830 census).
- As previously noted, Arther White is found on tax rolls and petitions amid neighbors of both John 'S' White and John White Sr.
- Samuel Mills made his first appearance on the 1811 Giles County tax roll, suggesting that he came of age in late 1809 or early 1810. However, he made one earlier appearance on the Cabell 1809 roll. This would place his birth in 1787 or 1788. When Samuel applied for bounty land in 1855, he cited his age as 67, placing his birth November 1787 to November 1788.
- William Murphy on 14 October 1806 married Nancy Prince there in Giles. 183 On the 1810 census of Giles, he is 1 house from Samuel and Rachel.

The actual marriage entry, in the reconstructed Giles Co. register imaged below, names no parents for Samuel at all and only Rachel's father. <sup>184</sup>



#### COMMENT:

Again, this pair of actions should reference the proposed brothers James and John Jr. The Stowers family lived on East River between John White Sr. and John Toney's ferry/inn/mill/store.

"The Commonwealth against **John White**, a writ of inquiry awarded and set aside, Plea filed and a Jury sworn to ... to wit Joshua Bartley, Philip Peters, Linsey Davis, Frances Scott, **Thos. Sartain**, Isaac French, Travas Stowers, **Man H White**, Jehu Burgess & Jesse Boling, who [found] the Defendant not guilty." <sup>187</sup>

### COMMENT:

- Note that in every case, the John involved in the Stowers-White brawl of earlier in the year is simply called "John White," not Sr. or Jr.
- The phrase "Man H White" is underscored in the recorded orders, a practice usually used to signify a recognized misspelling. Almost certainly, this is Benjaman H. White.

- Considering that Toney's suit against "Benjamin H. White" was set aside on the same date as this sale, it would appear that this sale was made for funds to settle the suit by Toney.

- Giles Co. deeds show that Benjamin White and wife Ann, in September 1808, had sold 98 acres on Wolf Creek, "a branch of Bluestone" to John Toney and John McClaugherty. Although they purchased the land in 1804, it was never taxed to them in Giles.

#### COMMENT:

- Giles County tax rolls of this period do not consistently give a date on which each list was collected.
- John of Big Spring has lost one tithe and one horse. This is the year that Samuel Mills appears on the roll of Cabell County.
- The consecutive entries for John and Benjamin, on same-dated list, implies that after Benjamin lost his land in 1808, he moved to the land of John Sr.
- This is the first time that the "hunter" designation is attached to John White Jr. on the tax roll or elsewhere. The taxable property of this "John White, hunter" syncs with that of John White Jr. in 1807. In this year 1809, John "Jr." does not appear as such and records subsequently abstracted in this paper clearly show that John Jr.; John White, hunter; John H. White; and "John Hunter White are one and the same. In 1817 the personal tax roll attached "H" to James of Doe Creek/ Salt Pond Mountain also to distinguish him from a new James that came onto the roll at East River.

Beginning at a buckeye and Cucumber on the river bank, S 58° W 10 poles to a buckeye, S 23° E 24 poles to a white oak, S 8\_ W 44 poles to a black oak on steep hill side, S 25° W 30 poles to two white oaks on a **rige** [*sic*], S 11° W 30 poles to a black oak and red oak, S 42 W 22 poles to a white oak on a hill side, S 200 E 3\_? poles to a chesnut on a point, S 77° E 32 poles to a hickory & chesnut, N 49° E 44 poles to an Ash in the head of a hollow, N 86° E 92 poles to a Lynn on the river bank and thence down the several Courses thereof and binding thereof 160 poles to the Beginning."

Deed acknowledged in Court by the said Snodgrass and ordered to be Recorded."204

#### COMMENT:

- At the question marks above, the calls were written into the crack of the book and were unreadable.
- This John is John White Jr., who sold the tract with wife Nancy [Copley] in February 1816.

Proved April Court 1810 by acknowledgement of Snodgrass. <sup>205</sup>

#### COMMENT:

- The January 1788 survey of John Abram Glymph's land placed it adjacent to Michael Madden. <sup>206</sup>
- This 1810 document is recorded consecutively with Sartain to Marrs and **John White [Jr.]** to Straley.
- On 24 April 1806 Randall Lucas patented land at head of Doe Creek (Salt Pond area) *adjacent* to *John White* and *Thomas Cassady.*<sup>207</sup>

"In witness whereof the said John White and Nancy his wife have hereunto set their his hand an fixed his seal the day and year first above written. {seal} {seal}." [sic] No witnesses. Proved April Court 1810 by acknowledgement of John White.<sup>208</sup>

#### COMMENT:

This John White with wife Nancey [nee Copley] is **John White Jr.** However, note subsequent documents in which he is called John H.

On 13 February 1815, James Straley and wife Betsey sold 7 acres of this land to Joseph Jackson, saying it was the land Straley lived on and that it was part of 100 acres patented to "John White." <sup>209</sup>

- On 27 February, John White and wife Nancy (the former Nancy Copley who married John [Jr.] in 1792, Montgomery Co.) sold these 75 acres to John Henderson.<sup>212</sup> That deed mentioned that the land lay "at the head of a hollow." That should be Camping Hollow where Copleys lived.

Benjamin, who was in the Wolf Creek/East River area for several years before this, is now listed among families of lower Giles. His loss of the land on East River amid suits by John Toney may have prompted him to farm with his brothers in the Doe Creek–Salt Pond Mountain area.

The household appears to lack one male in the 0–10 age group. See the children's sketch for Benjamin's offspring at the start of this paper, for the discussion of *Benjamin Wesley*, born about 1802.

The ages for the rest of the household are compatible with a couple who married in 1792. #### COMMENT:

- Eighteen appears to be the tithable age at this point in Giles Co. If so, the second tithe in John Sr.'s household could be their eldest child, born, say, in early 1793. However, the timing is tight. More commonly, young males did not appear on a personal-tax roll until the year *after* they reached tithable age.
- Frankey's hypothetical son William Mills, of the Whitt-Witt Y, is missing this year from Franklin County's personal tax roll.<sup>218</sup>
- Samuel Mills in 1809 was on the Cabell roll, but was not taxed in Cabell in 1810. This is his first year charged under his own name in Giles. If he has just come of age, it would place his birth at c1789–90.
- Benjamin White is again missing. He is not likely to be the second tithe in John Sr.'s household in this year 1811, because the 1812 tax roll charges Benjamin White with three tithes. With two sons of tithable age in 1812, by 1811 he should have had at least one of tithable age.
- The Cabell rolls of this period show a Benjamin (not Benjamin H.), James, and John—representing, apparentely, the Whites who had lived on Sugar Run.



#### COMMENT:

The sequence of the names imply that John White Sr. was indebted to Philip Miller and that John White Jr. and Benjamin H. White had served as his sureties. The situation implies that they are close kin.

Given the fact that "hunter" is appended multiple times to the names of John White and that James White was called "James White H" on the 1817 tax roll, I have studied all Hunter records I have enountered while reading the court, deed, and probate records of Montgomery and Giles—seeking some indication that "Hunter" might be an alias for the Giles. This is the only document in which I have found the Hunter family connected to one of the Whites.

After Benjamin lost his land to John Toney in 1808, he appears to have farmed with the three family members who did own land: John Sr. on East River, John Jr. of Camping Hollow, and James of Doe Creek. By 1816, Benjamin had saved sufficiently to purchase land in the Brush Creek area where he had originally intended to settle, according to Gordon Cloyd's assertions in his September 1813 title clearance, below.

## 1 SEPTEMBER 1813 GILES COUNTY, VA

Land sale.

**Gordon Cloyd** to **Joseph McKinney**, both of Giles. "Whereas in the year **1798** the said Gordon Cloyd surveyed in the name of Thomas Cloyd" 105 acres "on the ridge dividing the waters of **East river** from those waters falling into **Brush Creek. Benjamin White now deceased** who was one of the chain bearers wished to possess himself of the said Survey and it was then agreed if the said **Benjamin White**

Complied with the verbal bargain then made the said Cloyd would convey such right as might be required under the Survey then made but no responsibility of title other than a special warrantee from the said Gordon as whoever obtained the grant was to be given and whereas the said Benjamin White sold to James Copley who paid said Gordon the the [sic] Sum contracted by the said Benjamin White his claim and interest in & to the said Survey and the said James Copley informed the said Gordon that he had Sold his claim & Right therein to his brother Joshua Copley, who also informed the said Gordon that he had sold his right interest and claim in the survey aforesaid to Joseph McKenney and desired the said Gordon to convey to the said McKinney and for and in consideration of" \$100 "paid in property by the said James Copley to the said Gordon Cloyd he doth ... sell unto the said Joseph McKenney the said piece or parcel" of 105 acres as patented the 16<sup>th</sup> of September 1802." Adjoins Joseph Cloyd's inclusive survey of 680 acres [m & b not copied for want of time]. No witnesses shown. No proof in court. <sup>226</sup>

#### COMMENT:

James Copley was "special bail" for "Benjamin H. White" amid the latter's 1808–9 debts to John Toney, prior to Benjamin's sale of his East River land to Toney. I did not find a deed from Benjamin (H) to James Copley.

General Cloyd, a man who owned land across several counties, almost certainly erred in stating that "Benjamin White" was "now deceased." No other Benjamin White was taxed in Montgomery or Giles between 1792 and 1820.

## 26 OCTOBER 1813 GILES COUNTY, VA

Court order.

"John White" serves on a jury with Elijah Sartain. 227

#### COMMENT:

This would appear to be John Jr., aka John Hunter White.

## 26 OCTOBER 1813 GILES COUNTY, VA

Court order.

"John White" and Elijah Sartain served on a grand jury." 228

#### COMMENT:

Again, because of age restrictions on jurors, this should be John Jr., aka John Hunter White. Property and tax requirements should also apply. Even though John Sr. is named on the patent to the Preston land at Big Spring, he was not the tax payer.

# 27 DECEMBER 1814 GILES COUNTY, VA

"On motion of John Newman for an award of an Execution on a forth coming against **Benjamin H White** and **Cornelius White** notice being Proven Judgement is therefore granted the Plt against the said defendents according to bond interest & cost and the Defendents in mercy &c. Absent Isaac Chapman Gent. [one of the justices]"

"John Peters Senr against Benjamin H. White & Cornelius White. The same." 235

#### COMMENT:

The suit seems to hinge upon a debt. In such cases, the first-named defendant was usually the debtor, with the second-named defendant being the surety for the debt.

This is the earliest document I've found for Cornelius White, whose descendants allege (without presenting evidence) a birth date of 10 June 1793. If that birth date is correct, he is now twenty-one, legally able to serve as surety and to be sued. As seen below, he was appointed a constable in 1815 and makes his first named appearance on the tax roll in 1816 (born c1793–94).

Cornelius's birth period allows him to be considered a possible son of John White Sr. and Frankey Mills, who married in August 1792. His descendants assert that he was the son of Benjamin White and Ann Goodwin.

Indirect evidence does suggest that Cornelius was indeed Benjamin and Ann's son.

- When he makes his first appearance on the tax roll of 1816, a tithable is simultaneously subtracted from the Benjamin White household. No tithable is dropped that year from the household of John White Sr. and Frankey. To the contrary, they *gained* a tithable from 1814 to 1815 and another between 1816 and 1817.
- The records subsequently created by Cornelius in Mercer County suggest that he named a son Benjamin H.

Subsequently, in Mercer County, association would continue for decades between Cornelius White and Samuel Mills, son of Frankey and step-son of John Sr. In 1855, Cornelius would create an affidavit in support of Samuel Mills's application for War of 1812 bounty land.<sup>237</sup>

#### **COMMENT:**

- James H. White of Doe Creek appears to be omitted.
- John White Sr. is no longer taxed adjacent to Benjamin. Instead, he is clustered with a newly added name: William. However, John Sr.'s household has not lost a tithe from prior rolls, suggesting that William was not John Sr.'s son.
- The identity of this William has never been proved. In 1816, he married one Editha White. See the discussion, below, under their December 1816 marriage record.

## 10 FEBRUARY 1816 GILES COUNTY, VA

**Robert Waddell and wife Elizabeth** to **John White** for \$250 in hand paid, **99 acres** granted to RW on 1 July 1813 on **Bear Spring**, a branch of New River in Giles, no neighbors cited. No witnesses. Thomas Shannon and James Bane, justices of the peace, certified that Waddell acknowledged the document before them on 10 February 1816, that they examined Waddell's wife Elizabeth on 10 February. Proved Giles Court March 1816 by their certification. <sup>239</sup>

## COMMENT:

The 1816 land-tax roll charges these 99 acres on Bear Spring to "John H White." This would be John White Jr. (aka John Hunter White, John White H, John White Hunter), who sold his 75 acres in Camping Holler this same month. Bear Spring flows into New River, on the western bank, below Walker Creek.

## 27? FEBRUARY 1816 GILES COUNTY. VA

Land sale.

**John White** and **Nancy** his wife to **John Henderson**, all of Giles, sale for \$150 in hand paid, **75 acres on New River** in Giles, no neighbors cited. No witnesses: Proved Giles Court February 1816 by John's acknowledgement. <sup>240</sup>

## COMMENT:

This would be John White Jr., who married Nancy Copley, selling the land they bought in December 1809.

"Witnesseth 1816 where as the above Named John Toney hath Leased to the above named John Conner a Sertain parsel of Land containing of **Sixty acres** it Lying at the East end of a tract of Land containing [194] acres, it being a part of the Same Survey that is Near **Toneys Mill** for the term of Seven years Commensing [15 May 1816] which term Expiers on the [15 May 1823] at which time Said Conner is to leave all the Cleared Land in good order for farming. Or Should Conner Leave the place before the above mentioned term Expiers he is to return it back to the said Toney or his heirs as the case may be and I John Toney being the prier owner do preveledge the said Conner to Clear or improve where he may think proper on said Land in witness my hand and Seal this day and date as above written signed & delived in the presence of us. [Signed] John Toney. Test [witnesses]: Jonathan Toney, **Zachariah Crawford, William Mills**.

"At Giles **April Court 1819.** This lease from John Toney to John Conner was acknowledged in Court and ordered to be Recorded. Teste David French C.G.C." <sup>241</sup>

#### COMMENT:

Note under 15 May 1817 another lease, same wording, same parties, made to Zachariah Crawford, with William Mills as witness also. Two such documents, exactly one year apart, with the same set of witnesses do call into question the accuracy of the year for one of them.

It is possible that Toney habitually executed rent contracts on 15 April. (I've done so for decades on 15 October with a renter's farm lease.) If this is the case, then William Mills would seem to have been employed by Toney from at least 15 April 1816 through 15 April 1817.

This John Toney appears repeatedly in association with Benjamin (H.) White from 1808 to 1819.

The 1816 tax roll places these 60 acres "at Toney's Ferry on N[ew] River abt. 11 [miles] NW" of courthouse.

25 MAY 1816 GILES COUNTY, VA

Marriage

Cornelius White to Polly Garrason. No parental or other data.<sup>242</sup>

#### COMMENT:

Polly was the adult daughter of William Garrison who would, shortly after this, sell to Cornelius part of his land. "Rev. William Garrison" would, in the early 1830s, conduct the marriage ceremonies for Samuel Mills (to his second wife) and for Samuel's son Robert.<sup>243</sup>

#### COMMENT:

Benjamin (H) has lost a tithe in this year 1816, when Cornelius is added to the rolls. John Sr.
has the same number of tithes as in previous years. This, alone, does not rule out the
possibility that Cornelius might be a son of John and Frankey; it is possible that a son dropped

from their household in the same year that another one came onto the roll. However, Cornelius was a name used in the Goodwin family of Benjamin's wife Ann.<sup>244</sup>

• Benjamin (H) at this point owns no land and appears to be farming with John Sr., while Cornelius and William have gone out on their own and likely begun the clearing of vacant land together.

## 2 NOVEMBER 1816 GILES COUNTY, VA

Land purchase

Andrew Fulton and Archibald Stuart Junr., surviving executors of the last will & testament of **Benjamin Stuart** Decd., of the County of Augusta, to **Benjamin White** of Giles Co., for \$200 in hand paid, sale of land in Giles (formerly Montgomery) "on **Christians fork of Brush Creek** adjoining or near **Genl. [Gordon] Cloyds** (formerly Thomas Christians) land on the **East side**," containing 248 acres by estimation:

Beginning at three white oak Saplings on the South side of the Creek by a ford & runing [sic] thence N 55° W 270 poles crossing a branch to three white oak Saplings on a hill, thence N 35° W 140 poles to two Spanish oak Saplings on a hill side, S 55° W 278 poles crossing the head of a Spring to a double white oak in the fork of a branch, & S 37° E142 poles to the beginning

"being the same land that was granted to the said Benjamin Stuart by patent" dated 11 July 1791.

Acknowledged before Alex<sup>r</sup> MClails? & William Bays, magistrates, on 2 November 1816. Presented by them at March Court 1818. Ordered to be recorded.<sup>245</sup>

#### COMMENT:

This places Benjamin White adjacent to Toney land during the April 1816–April 1817 dates that William Mills appears to have worked for Toney.

## 2 DECEMBER 1816 GILES COUNTY, VA

Marriage

William White to Editha White. No parental or other data.<sup>246</sup>

### COMMENT:

At this point, four White males in Giles were of age to have marriageable children: John Sr., John Jr. (aka John H.), Benjamin, and James of Doe Creek.

Beginning in 1818 there were two Williams over 21:

- 1818: (1) "William," consecutive with Cornelius & John Sr.
  - (2) "William Sr.," consecutive with "John son of Jack." This would be the son William to whom John H White subsequently deeded land amid debts.
- 1819: (1) "William" consecutive with John Sr. & Benjamin's son John (called "John Jr.").
  - (2) "William" who is two listings before John H and his sons Thomas and John at Bear Spring.

Known evidence is ambiguous as to the parentage of both William and Editha. Unsourced online trees and one undocumented history of Logan County<sup>247</sup> offer three claims for William and Editha's identities. A fourth is also possible, but is not proposed elsewhere:

### Hypothesis 1:

- William was son of "Jack White" and Susannah Marcum of Cabell (later Logan)
- Editha was daughter of Benjamin H. White of Cabell

Two pieces of evidence uncovered in this project speak to this hypothesis:

- 1. If William was son of John White and Susannah Marcum who married in 1796, theoretically born *after* the marriage, then he would have been 20 or younger at the time of his marriage. That marriage record, however, presents him as over 21, marrying without parental consent.
- 2. Indirect evidence (two pieces) supports the parentage claimed for Editha.
  - A. Her given name was not a common one in their society. It is found among Benjamin H.'s wife's family: the Goodwins of Amherst. On 17 October 1808, the Amherst court appointed a guardian (Jno. Burford) for "Spicey and **Editha** Goodwin, orphans of Geo. Goodwin.<sup>248</sup>
  - B. Because Editha was of age (21) at the time of the 1816 marriage, she would have been 15 or greater in 1810 (i.e., born 1795 or earlier). The 1810 census data for Benjamin's household does include 3 daughters aged 10–15.

## Hypothesis 2:

- William was son of "John White" or "Jack White" of Montgomery and Giles.
- Editha was daughter of Benjamin H. White of Giles.

Two pieces of evidence uncovered in this project are relevant here:

- 1. Jack White of Montgomery and Giles, husband of Nancy Copley, did have a son William. However, that son William married in 1820 to their neighbor Lavina Munsey<sup>249</sup> and was continually taxed amid his family and hers from that point onward. Therefore, William was not a son of "Jack" and Nancy
- 2. For Editha as daughter of Benjamin H, see Hypothesis 1, above.

## Hypothesis 3:

- William was son of Benjamin H. and Ann (Goodwin) White
- Editha was daughter of John White Jr.

Evidence is also ambiguous for this hypothesis:

1. In 1813, 1814, and 1815, Benjamin H. was charged with three tithes—himself and two others. Benjamin's household did not lose a tithe in 1815, when William was added to the tithable rolls in his own name. Superficially, that point suggests that William may have come into the county from elsewhere. (It might be argued that another son of Benjamin came of age in the

year that William went on his own, but the census does not credit Benjamin with any sons who would reach 16 in 1815.)

- 2. Although Benjamin did not lose a tithe in 1815, he lost *two* tithes in 1816. Yet, only one new White-surnamed tithe was added to the roll that year, Cornelius. This suggests the possibility that Benjamin might have included William on his roll in 1815, not knowing that William was going to claim himself separately. (The 1815 roll does not cite the date that lists were submitted, leaving open the possibility that William may have moved out and submitted his own list after Benjamin submitted his list.)
- 3. Benjamin's 1810 census household did contain a son of age to be William, who cannot otherwise be accounted for. He had two sons in the 18–25 age bracket (hypothetically William and Cornelius) and two sons 0–10 (hypothetically James, born about 1800, and Benjamin Wesley, whose census ages consistently place his birth at 1802–3). However, Benjamin's 1810 household appears to be missing one male born about 1800–3: the younger John who came on the rolls in the Brush Creek area in 1819, 1821–22, and 1826.
- 4. The 1810 census household of John White Jr. (aka Jack and John H. of Camping Hollow and later Bear Spring) did contain a daughter of age to be Editha, who cannot otherwise be accounted for.

## Hypothesis 4 (not proposed elsewhere):

 William, who settled on the waters of East River, might have come across Toney's Ferry from Monroe. One William Sr. and Jr. appear there in random records of the 1805–20 period. I have not yet systematically worked Monroe County to investigate this possibility.

The claimed relationships set up the following propositions:

- 1. If Editha is daughter of Benjamin and William moved into the county from Cabell or Monroe, then no relationship is known between the spouses. It might be suspected, but would be more distant than first cousin.
- 2. If Editha is daughter of Benjamin, and William is son of John Jr. ("Jack") and Nancy, then Editha married her first cousin.
- 3. If Editha is daughter of Benjamin, and William is son of John Sr. by either Frankey or his first wife, then Editha married her uncle or half-uncle.
- 4. If Editha is daughter of John Jr., and William is son of John Sr. by either Frankey or his first wife, then Editha married her uncle or half-uncle.
- 5. If Editha is daughter of John Jr., and William is the son of Benjamin, then Editha married her first cousin.

It is far more likely that Editha married a first cousin (or a cousin more distant) rather than her father's brother or half-brother—suggesting that Proposition 1, 2, or 5 is the correct one.

Other information presented in this set of research notes rule out Proposition 2: The fact that John Jr. and Nancy's son William married in 1820 to their neighbor Lavina Munsey<sup>250</sup> and was continually taxed amid his family and hers from that point onward.

Propositions 1 and 4 are the only one remaining for Editha:

Editha was daughter of Benjamin H.

William was from Whites who lived outside Giles.

## Proposition 5:

Editha was daughter of John Jr., who did have a female her age in his 1810 household. William was son of Benjamin, who did have a male of William's age in his 1810 household.

## 25 MARCH 1817 GILES COUNTY, VA

"Johnston & Chapman asse. of **Joel Sartain** vs. **John White**, the Defendent comes into court and confesses the plaintiffs action for twenty pounds with interest from the first day of April 1811 and costs subject to a credit of twenty five dollars with stay of Execution until the further orders of the plaintiff."

"Chapman & Johnston against Benjamin H White dismisd." 251

### COMMENT:

The John White being sued by Sartain's assignees would be John White Jr. (aka John H) of south Giles. Joel Sartain, Johnston, and the Chapmans all resided in that area. Family connections were extensive:

- Joel Sartain's brother Elijah, back in 1791, married Sarah Mills.
- Archibald Chapman, in 1811, married Sarah's pre-marital daugter Elizabeth Mills.
- David Johnston of this lawsuit was married to Sally Chapman, aunt of Archibald.<sup>252</sup>

## 15 MAY 1817 GILES COUNTY, VA

Whereas the above Named John Toney hath Leased to the above named Zachariah Crafford a Sertain parsel of Land containing of Fifty acres by Survey in the **Bent of East River above Toneys Mill** for the term of Seven years Commensing this [15 May 1816] which term Expiers on the [15 May 1824] at which time Said Crafford is to leave all the Cleared Land in good order for farming. Or Should Crafford Leave the place before the above mentioned term Expiers he is to return it back to the said Toney or his heirs as the case may be and I John Toney being the prier owner do prevaledge the said Crafford to Clear or improve where he may think proper on Said Land in witness my hand and Seal this day and date as above written signed & delived in the presence of us. [Signed] John Toney. Test [witnesses]: **John Conner,** Jonathan Toney, **William Mills**.

"At Giles April Court 1819. This lease from John Toney to Zachariah Crawford was acknowledged in Court and ordered to be Recorded. Teste David French C.G.C."<sup>253</sup>

#### COMMENT:

Map 4 suggests that the "Bent of East River above Toney's Mills" was the dip (about 1 or 2 miles) west of East River's juncture with New River. Toney's Mills should be below the "Bent" (i.e., close to New River). This places the leased land between Toney's Mill and Five Mile Creek.

#### COMMENT:

- This is the first year that there have been two Jameses on the tax roll. Note the addition of the "H' to the name of the older James of Doe Creek.
- The position of the new James, coupled with Benjamin, suggests that he was a son of Benjamin. Benjamin's household has not lost a tithe since the previous year; however, another male could have come of tithable age in the year that James moved out. This seems especially likely given that Benjamin's horse/mule count has dropped from 3 to 1—one of those "losses" apparently representing the horse or mule that James took with him.
- This 1817 listing for James at Brush Creek would not be repeated in 1818 and 1819.
   Apparently he went back into the parental household until 1820, when he is again taxed in his own name.
- This new James is the James who married Meeky McKinney in 1821 and died in 1828, leaving property that was purchased at estate sale by Samuel Mills, his son David Mills, and four Whites: Cornelius, Ribin [Reuben], Thomas, and William.

Beginning at two white oaks & hickory Corner to **Toney's Land**, running with the same N 13 $^{\circ}$  210 poles to two white oaks in a hollow, Corner to **Toney**, N 60 $^{\circ}$  W 108 poles to two white oaks by the creek, S 79 $^{\circ}$  W 140 poles to a double swamp white oak by the Creek, S 220 poles up a branch to a double poplar on the north Side of a ridge, thence S 87 $^{\circ}$  E 278 poles to the Beginning.

Being the Same Land that was granted to the said Benjamin Stuart by patent dated 7 July 1791.

No witnesses. Proved in Augusta by certification of Claudius Buster and William Davis, magistrates saying Fulton and Stuart had acknowledged the deed before them on 26 July 1817. Proved in Giles Court, March 1818.<sup>254</sup>

#### COMMENT:

Benjamin has suddenly come into money. In the past eight months, he has made two payments of \$200 each for about 400 acres adjoining Toney. The estate of his father-in-law Micajah Goodwin appears not to have been opened in Amherst until 15 June 1818.<sup>255</sup>

This should be James H of Doe Creek. The younger James White of East River/Brush Creek is not yet old enough to serve on a jury.

## 25 NOVEMBER 1817 GILES COUNTY, VA

**Travis Stowers** and wife **Elizabeth** to **Cornelius White**, all of Giles sell for \$225 in hand paid, 127 acres in Giles County, on **East River**, surveyed for James Turner, beginning at mouth of **Harmons branch** on conditional line of **Wm Garrison**, running past Richard **Blankenship's** "conditional marked line." Proved in Giles Court December 1817 by Acknowledgement by Stowers after examination of Elizabeth.<sup>257</sup>

#### **COMMENT:**

- This East River location places Cornelius a few miles east of the site to which Benjamin moved.
- The National Map shows Harmon's Branch of East River as the next major stream above Five Mile Creek. (See next page).

#### COMMENT:

- On 25 November 1817, abstracted above, Cornelius purchased 127 acres "on East River at mouth of Harmon's Branch," from Travis Stowers, adjacent to Richard Blankenship and Cornelius's father-in-law William Garrison.
- On 2 November 1816 and 26 July 1817 (see those dates), "Benjamin White" bought two tracts on Christians Fork of Brush Creek, east side, from the estate of Benjamin Stuart, Dec'd.<sup>258</sup> He would sell that land in 1819, signing as "Benjamin H. White."<sup>259</sup>
- In September 1818, "Benjamin H. White" and "John White," apparently John Sr., petitioned the county court for an alteration of the road from "Five Mile Fork of East River to the poney Crossing on Brush Creek. Neighbors James and John McClaugherty and Robert Wilson were appointed to view the proposed alteration and submit an opinion to the court.<sup>260</sup>
- While Benjamin H. almost certainly had a son John, that John was too young in 1818 to sign such a petition. The John who joined with Benjamin in that petition appears to be Benjamin's father, John Sr., whose title to land in this region was confirmed in the 20 September 1819 mass-clearance deed (see that date below) executed by Christian Peters to John White Sen<sup>r</sup>, William White, John White Jun<sup>r</sup>, James White, Samuel Mills, and others.

#### **COMMENT:**

- This "Jack" is John H. White, aka the first "John Jr." of Montgomery and Giles.
- John White Sr. has lost a tithe since 1817. No new White male is added to the list. One of three explanations exist: (a) that tithable male has died; (b) that tithable male has gone to work for someone else who included him as an unnamed employee on his other list; or (c) that tithable male has gone on his own and left the county.
- "Robert Wiley" is the name that William Mills gave to a son born c1824. However, there were also Robert Wileys in Botetourt (a merchant), Kanawha, and Monroe Counties. I have not yet done reasonably exhaustive research in those three counties.

## 29 SEPTEMBER 1818 GILES COUNTY, VA

Court order

"On the application of **Benjamin H. White** and **John White** for an alteration of the road from the **mouth** of the **Five mile fork** of **East River** to the poney crossing of **Brush Creek**, it is ordered that **James McClaugherty, John McClaugherty, Robert Wilbern**, and **Philip Peters** or any three of them ... view the way perposed [*sic*] ... and report to this Court."<sup>261</sup>

#### COMMENT:

Requests for alterations in roads were made by landowners who lived on those roads. **This is a critical placement for John Sr.,** dating his move from Big Spring to Brush Creek. Given that (a) John's wife Frankey does not appear to be enumerated in 1820 and (b) John no longer co-owned land with William Preston (potential father of Frankey's daughter) after 1818, we might question whether her death might have occurred about 1818, prompting the old John to give up their home at Big Spring, perhaps with a buy-out from Preston, and move down East River to live with Benjamin.

## William Cooper to Sally White. No parental or other data.<sup>262</sup>

#### COMMENT:

William Cooper, as a child in 1798, had been bound out by the overseers of the poor to James McClaugherty.<sup>263</sup> James McClaugherty Sr. and Jr. were associates of John Toney and the two Benjamin Whites for a quarter-century or more.<sup>264</sup>

This Sally could only be the daughter of Benjamin and Ann White—one of the five females aged 0–15 in their 1810 household. The 1810 household of John Sr. and Frankey White did not have a daughter.

#### TO DO:

Obtain this bond and any related papers when Library of Virginia reopens. The digitized collection at *FamilySearch* begins with 1821. Others participating in the bond and or permissions should help to solidify Sally's placement in a birth family.

[Signed] Thomas Copley. Witnesse: Joseph Smith, Stephen Rowe (x),, and David Millirons (x). 265

In 1816, David Johnston was married to the widowed Sally (Chapman) Miller, aunt of Archibald Chapman who in 1811 married Elizabeth Mills, daughter of Sarah (Mills) Sartain. <sup>268</sup>

#### COMMENT:

Cornelius bought his first land on 25 November 1817 (see above) from Travis Stowers, adjacent to his (Cornelius') father-in-law William Garrison and Richard Blankenship. That tract should be the land referenced above as "the land Cornelius White now lives on." Now, he is expanding onto two additional tracts—part of Blankinship's land and (below) part of his father-in-law's land.

Travis Stowers in 1799 had married Elizabeth Blankenship, daughter of Peter, by a Montgomery County bond.<sup>271</sup>

#### COMMENT:

"Jr." in this era meant "the younger," not just "son of" as is common today. Four John Whites are now adult tithables:

- John Sr., who has left Big Spring (the land held jointly with Preston) and located on Brush Creek where his land title would be confirmed in September, below.
- John Jr. of Brush Creek, apparently Benjamin's son. If he were John Sr.'s son, then "John Jr." aka John Hunter) should not be John Sr.'s son. While it is possible that John Sr. gave his name to two sons, one from each marriage, the odds are against it.
- John Hunter aka "Jack" of Bear Spring, formerly John Jr. Note, below, that in 1821 after the last appearance of John Sr. of Brush Creek on the 1821 tax roll, the Bear Spring John calls himself "John Seigner."
- John, who previously apepared on a tax roll as "son of Jack."

Both the 1820 tax list and the 1820 census would show *three* John White households in Giles—John Sr., John Jr. [of Brush Creek], and John "Hunter" [of Bear Spring].

Two Williams are still present:

- William in the neighborhood of John Sr., Cornelius, Benjamin H. and the new John Jr.
- William in the neighborhood of John H. "Jack" and his sons Thomas and John.

#### COMMENT:

Benjamin H. is not included neighborhood. He and wife Nancy have sold their land on Christian's Fork of Brush Creek and the household is enumerated as "Benjamin H. White" in 1820 in contiguous Cabell County.

## 28 JANUARY 1820 GILES COUNTY, VA

#### COMMENT:

This William would be the William named as son in the 25 April 1822 deed, below, executed by John White of Bear Spring (husband of Nancy Copley). Tax rolls shows that William remained there amid his parents, siblings, and the Munseys.<sup>276</sup>

## **COMMENT:**

The absence of a reference to his very much alive wife goes unexplained. By law, she should have been questioned by the judge or justice, separate from Cornelius, to get her consent.

Occasionally a wife did not go into court to make the acknowledgment with her husband, if (for example) she was ill. The prevailing pattern for this time and place, in those cases, was for the document not ordered to be recorded until she was questioned and gave her consent.

#### COMMENT:

- The male 16–18, which I've greyed out above, is duplicated in the 16–25 category, as per Census Bureau instructions for this year.
- The age of the oldest female in this John White household is too young to be Frankey. Several explanations could exist, including these: (a) The census taker put his tickmark in the wrong column; (b) Frankey is dead and John has found a new wife; (c) the 26-44 female is an unmarried daughter that was not enumerated in 1810; (d) the 26-44 female is the wife of one of the males 18-25.
- Explanation (d) is the most compatible with other known data.

- There remain a considerable number of offspring that need to be identified.
- The four children aged 0-10 should be too young to be children of Frankey. Her oldest proved child (Rachel Mills) is now about 34. The two boys 10-15 do correspond to the males

attributed to John's and Frankey's household in 1810 and would be of age to be sons of Frankey.

- All things considered, it appears that this is a combined household, shared by John with a son 16–18, 2 sons 10–15, and a married son and his wife who are about 25–26 and have 4 children 0–10. The younger couple would not be the William and Editha who married in 1816; that couple was enumerated in their own home, below.
- Comparing this John White household with the 1810 household yields the following conclusions:
  - one male b. 1792–93 is missing
  - o two males b. 1795–1800 are missing
  - o one male b. 1795–1800 might be still in the household
  - o two males b. 1800–10 appear to be still in the household
  - o one male b. 1800-10 is missing





### 30 JANUARY 1821 GILES COUNTY, VA

### COMMENT:

In August 1805 Chrispyanos Walker witnessed two documents for sale of land by Isaiah Perdue of Tazewell County to John Peters. The land was on "S side of New River below the mouth of Wolf Creek." <sup>282</sup>

This William White, in the neighborhood of Cornelius White and Chrispyanos Walker, should be the William who married Editha—i.e., part of the Benjamin and Ann White family, as Cornelius also seems to be. (See analysis under the 1810 census entry.) Meanwhile, John Sr. and Frankey White's son Samuel Mills also married into the Prince family: Rachel Prince, daughter of John.

#### COMMENT:

### Regarding locations:

Note that the above list explicitly places the old John on "B.C" where Benjamin H. had previously lived and where Benjamin H.'s apparent brother James (John Sr.'s proposed grandson) is also said to be. This provides a location for the land his offspring acquired via the mass title clearance of 1819.

#### Regarding names:

Some of these tax rolls present the given name first, then surname. For consistency, this set of notes puts surname first. However, in the case of John (Hunter) White, the inversion does not clearly convey what is represented. On these tax rolls, H is rarely used for him as a middle initial. Instead it is an appendage following his surname, as with the "B. C"," "D. C"," and "J son" used for other Whites. An occasional *deed* did use "H" as his middle initial, alternating with the name John "Hunter" White.

**Note:** This is the last record found for John White Sr. I will continue to include here a variety of Giles County records that help to sort out his offspring.

No witnesses named. Acknowledged by Morgan "before two Justices of the peace and returned into Court. September term 1821. <sup>283</sup>

#### COMMENT:

The word "Seigner" is written very clearly. The index entry, made contemporaneously, is "White, John, Sen"." Clearly, "Senior" is the designation intended.

This is *not* the "John White Sr" who married widow Frankey Mills. This John White who is buying land from Edmund Morgan—and later sold it with wife Nancy—is John White Jr. (husband of Nancy Copley), who is now "elevated" to "Sr." From this use of Sr. for John Jr., we may hypothesize that **the older John who married Frankey has died.** Note that when the county split in 1824, the John "Sr." who ended up in Logan County is the age of "John Jr." aka John H., not that of John Sr. However, John H. remained in Giles; he is not the John Sr. of 1830 Logan.

No witnesses. Acknowledged and proved in Giles June Court 1822.<sup>288</sup>

#### COMMENT:

This John White of Bear Spring was the husband of Nancy Copley. See 14 September 1824, below, for the sale of this land by "John H White, Nancy his wife, and Hannah White." Given the 27 March document by which John, amid his debts, swore he had already given part of his land to "son William" without benefit of deed—a failure he remedied on this same day that he and Nancy deeded land to Hannah—it would appear that Hannah was a female relative for whom he was also trying to provide protection (or one he was using to shield another part of his land).

Notably, John did not state a relationship to Hannah as he did with "son William" and he did not use the phrase "for good will and affection," as he did with William. Similarly in the 14 September 1824 deed below, by which John and Nancy sold this land together with Hannah, the deed states that Nancy is John's wife but does not state a relationship to Hannah.

Hannah would appear to be an unmarried sister or widowed sister-in-law. If John H. (previously John Jr.) was a son of John Sr. who married Frankey Mills in 1792, then John H.'s mother should not still be living.

No witnesses. Acknowledged and proved in Giles June Court 1822.<sup>289</sup>

This John White would be John H. White, as per the 27 March 1822 assignment of his land to the sheriff, above.

French, deputy for the said Christopher Champ fifty dollars, it being the balance of the said Judgment in full satisfaction Of the same ..." The land is described as

Beginning at a large White oak & Mapel by a Road on the side of a Hill, thence N 66° E 60 poles to a white oak, N 45° E 52 poles to a white oak & Hickory by a branch, S6 W 28 poles to a Double? Sowerwood and Hickory, S 3 ½ E 46 poles to a chestnut on the side of a Hill, S 24 E 18 poles to a poplar in a Hollow, S 24 W 41 poles to two chesnuts on the side of a Mountain, S 68 W 190 poles to a chestnut by a large Rock, N 12 W 40 poles to two chesnuts, N 57 E 97 poles to a Red oak, S 7 ½ E 28 poles to a hickory, N 65 E 16 poles to a black oak on a side, N 5 E 44 ;poles to a white oak and hickory on the top of a ridge, and thence N35 E 44 to the beginning.

- A new Major White appears somewhat removed but apparently still in the Brush Creek area. Given that the 1796 marriage bond of John White to Susanna Marcum had "Major Marcum" as John's surety, Major White would superficially seem to be a son of that marriage. However, I've found no members of that family in the bounds of present Giles County since c1806.
- This Major White is not taxed in Giles after this point. One candidate for him appears on the **1830 Logan County** census, as a male 20–29, with an apparent wife and four children. Other offspring of John White Sr. (Benjamin H. and Isaac) also appear to be enumerated there. See those notes below.
- The only Whites who would remain in Giles in 1830 were the two clusters southeast of Pearisburg (the families of James and John Jr.).

Hoge & Kirk vs. **White**, the defendant came here into and signed and subscribed a schedule of all his whole estate and took the oathe prescribed by Law for Insolvent debtors and is discharged from the custody of the Sheriff.<sup>292</sup>

This would be John Hunter White [John Jr.], husband of Nancy Copley.

Ordered that Ezekiel Smith be appointed overseer of the road from Charles Dingess to Reuben French's Field on Brush Creek in the room of James Coplea." <sup>293</sup>

#### COMMENT:

- This William of Brush Creek should be the son or son-in-law of Benjamin.
- Reuben French in 1819 bought half the Christian's Fork of Brush Creek land of Benjamin White.
- Charles Dingess' will left a significant bequest to Evalina White, daughter of "Elizabeth White." The context of the bequest suggests that he was the likely father of Elizabeth's child. Both Samuel Mills and the proposed sons of Benjamin White were active in his estate settlement.

### 27 AUGUST 1823 GILES COUNTY, VA

This is Wesley's first appearance on record, suggesting that he has just come of age—i.e., born 1802–3.

The 1850 and 1860 censuses of Logan County, however, identify "Westley," age 48 and 58 respectively, as *Benjamin W.* (1850) and *Wesley* (1860). Both censuses attribute to him sons Benjamin H. and Cornelius, and a wife Sarah. The data from this pair of censuses suggest that he was more likely from the Benjamin branch of the family. Considerably more work needs to be done on Wesley and all the Whites who were cut away into Logan and Mercer.

In 1824, for example, Adam White and Jacob White were added to the tax rolls consecutively with James of Doe Creek, at the same time that two tithes were dropped from James' charge.

The second William on Brush Creek of East River has not been identified. The William with three horses should be the William who married Editha in 1815; they did not yet have a son of tithable age.

The presence of the second William in this family cluster suggests kinship. The only way a second William seems to fit into the family would be as one of the yet-unidentified sons of John Sr. and Frankey. If so, this reduces the odds of Frankey being the mother of William Mills-Whitt. It is *possible* that she might name a son William White, even though she had a still living son William Mills—if, for example, her husband insisted upon using that given name—but the odds are against it in their society.

As an alternate hypothesis: William Mills-Whitt is missing from the tax rolls of Franklin County during the 1820s, suggesting that he left Franklin to work elsewhere. *Possibly,* if he had sought work among White kinsman and turned in his list with them, the clerk *might* have absent-mindedly copied his name as "White" rather than Mills. Errors of that type were not uncommon.

This "second William" of Brush Creek has not been found on subsequent tax rolls. However, I have not yet finished my page-by-page reading of Giles' deeds, court minutes, and probate records for the 1820s.



#### COMMENT:

Samuel Mills's purchase of a 1/9<sup>th</sup> part of a ½ interest in a tract of land, roughly 11 acres, strongly suggests a kinship. The only kinship found thus far is the one discussed below.

Note that Samuel Mills and **John McClaugherty** are both present for the sale. This John McClaugherty married Sally Dingess, 12 August 1813.<sup>334</sup> Charles's will named her as a deceased sister, saying that she had three children. Two are named in his estate settlement, the third is not. That third child appears to be the "Sally Mills" who, in 1824, chose Sally Dingess's husband John McClaugherty, Esq., as the guardian of her inheritance from her mother. No document states the paternity of "Sally Mills," but the only male resident in the county in the period of her birth was Samuel. (*Note:* One William Mills, apparently of Franklin County, has been placed in the neighborhood of Samuel Mills and John and Franky White in 1816–17, but he has not been placed in the county at the time calculated for Sally's conception.

The 1/9 of 1/2 of 200 acres that Samuel purchased indicates that the deceased Charles A. Dingess (a) died in possession of one undivided half of a tract to which he was an heir or, less likely, one he bought in partnership with someone else; and (b) he had nine heirs who were to divide his property equally. That might be 9 children or 8 children and a widow who agreed to take a child's part as her dower. No references to a widow or former wife have been found in the papers detailing the settlement of his estate.

In any event, a man rarely bought 1/9 share of a piece of land—much less 1/9 of ½ share—unless there was a family connection and he could foresee buying the rest. Otherwise, he was spending money on what would certainly become a passel of problems.

Online trees state, without evidence, that "Charles Anderson Dingess" married Sarah Farley and "Elizabeth White." There is no evidence of a marriage to either woman and he was single at the time of his death. An Elizabeth White connection appears in Charles' will in which he bequeathed property to "Eveline White, daughter of Elizabeth White." Nothing in his will or estate settlement identifies Elizabeth's family, but four facts are relevant.

• Elizabeth would not be a daughter of Frankey and John White, i.e., Samuel's half-sister. The 1810 census does not attribute a daughter to Frankey & John's household. It does attribute females of appropriate age to the Benjamin White household.

- As seen above, Benjamin H. White (proposed brother of Elizabeth) witnessed both the will of Charles Dingess' father and the deed of gift that the elder Dingess gave to Charles in 1809.
- Given that Samuel Mills was only a step-child to the Whites, then a step-relationship to the mother of Dingess' child would not explain Samuel's willingness to take on the problems of a 1/18 share.
- If, however, Samuel Mills was the father of Sally Mills by Charles Dingess's sister Sarah, then Samuel's reason for purchasing the 1/9 of ½ interest would be to provide for his daughter a piece of her Dingess family's land.

Dingess marriage records are sparse. I've found none for any Dingess male, but

- Polly Dingess married David French, 8 June 1787 [named as sister in Charles' will]
- Elizabeth Dingus married Charles Neil, 14 January 1793 [ditto]
- Sally Dingess married John McClaugherty on 12 August 1813 [ditto]
- Susan Dingus married Ezekial Smith, 2 February 1821 in Montgomery Co. 335 [ditto]

This document is not indexed under White's name. I found it because it was filed immediately before a document executed by and indexed under White's name.

### **COMMENT:**


Jonathan Toney was the son of John Toney for whom William Mills witnessed the Toney-Conner and Toney-Crawford leases of 1816 and 1817. In 1814, Jonathan was already operating his father's ferry. In 1819 Toney sold all his goods to his son Jonathan, who apparently did not buy land elsewhere. This trio of documents place William Mills of 1816–17 in the same small neighborhood as Robert and Samuel Mills and the Whites of 1839.

In 1839, Robert and Samuel Mills were residents of the new county of Mercer. Apparently their land lay very near the Mercer-Giles line; hence, their appearance at the Toney sale in Giles.

### COMMENT:

The notes on this list range from 1829 to January 1842. White's is the oldest note. There's a much longer list of insolvent debts going back to 1845.

11 SEPTEMBER 1847 GILES COUNTY, VA

Nancy White, widow of John H. White, Decd., Robert White, Sally White [sic] and Nancy White, children and heirs of John H. White, decd. of Giles Co., to Hugh D. Ferral of same. Whereas the said John H. White by his will left 100 acres to "wife Nancy during her natural life and then to his son Robert & his two daughters Sally & Nancy, the parties have mutually agreed" to sell the land to Ferrel for \$60 ... land at Gap Mountain, described as

Beginning at a black oak and chesnut locust on a hickory on the **Gap Mountain**, then N 26 W 40 poles to two gums, S 6 W 96 poles to a white oak and red oak and two dogwoods, S 40 E 60 poles to a black oak and chesnut oak, N 64 E 96 poles to the beginning.

Property is sold "with a privilige of taking stone and timber any where with a parallel line to the top of the Gap Mountain." Signed: Nancy White, Robert White, Nancy White, Sally White. Acknowledgment on 11 September 1847 by the four Whites before Isaac **Epling** and Robert Payne, magistrates of Giles Co. Presented [by the magistrates] at Giles Court 27 March 1848 by oath of the .<sup>352</sup>

The 1840 census has only one John H. White in Giles, with the following data: 353

19 MAY 1847 GILES COUNTY, VA

Will

"I, John H. White do hereby make my last will and Testament in manner and form following, that is to say: Do will to Nancy White my wife all my land and property [during] her lifetime for maintenance and after her death the said land and property shall return to Sally and Nancy White my two daughters and Robin White my sun [sic] also Sally and Nancy and Robin White must maintain Nancy White my wife [during] her lifetime, the said Sally and Nancy and Robin White must pay the rest of the airs [sic] one dollar each at the death of Nancy White my wife. And lastly I do constitute and appoint my friend James H White executor of this my last Will & Testament hereby revoking all other or former Wills or Testaments by me heretofore by me made. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal May 19<sup>th</sup> 1847. John H. White (his X mark). Test. George Jordin, Washington Bish." Proved in court of Giles June 28<sup>th</sup> 1847 by oaths of George Gordan [sic], White & Washington Bish.<sup>354</sup>
