Birth of Shadrack Odom to William Odom and Jane Johnson.³²

COMMENTS:

Birth year is extrapolated from the 1839 and 1840 tax rolls of Newton. Shadrack was not of poll age (21) in 1839; he made his first appearance on the 1840 roll.

Shadrack’s birthplace is extrapolated from the fact that his father William appears on the Pike County tax rolls from 1818 through 1824, where he is charged for a poll but no land.³³

COMMENT:

On 11 July 1833, William would receive a patent to federal land in Madison County described as N½ E½ SW¼ S9, T10, R3. By that time, or shortly thereafter, he moved to the area now known as Newton County. At that time, it was the southern half of Neshoba County.

NESHOBA COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI

1834 Tax Roll³⁴

Wm. Odum 1 white poll; \$.375 tax

COMMENTS:

Shadrack, at 15, would be too young for this poll roll; the minimum age for poll-tax liability was 21. The settlement of the southern half of Neshoba (modern Newton County) began in this year 1834. William's future brothers-in-law, Samuel and John Cooksey, also appear on this 1834 roll.

26 FEBRUARY 1836

NEWTON COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI

Mississippi's legislature created Newton on this date from the southern half of Neshoba County. A county seat named Decatur was created, reportedly on land donated by a Cooksey-Odom neighbor, Isham Hollingsworth. Building began on the town in late 1836. The courthouse itself would have been created late 1836 and record-keeping would not have begun until early 1837.³⁵

NEWTON COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI

Marriage of Shadrack Odom to unidentified first wife. Time of marriage extrapolated from the birthdate of the first child, Samuel Odom, on 10 February 1838.³⁶

COMMENTS:

Shadrack does not appear. Although he was newly married, he would not be liable for poll tax until he reached 21 years.

COMMENTS:

The wife shown for Shadrack on this census should be his first, still-unidentified, wife. Note that she is older than Shadrack's second wife, Elizabeth Cooksey, who was born in 1822. The 1850

Death of Shadrack's first wife and his remarriage to Elizabeth Cooksey.

COMMENTS:

The time frame is bracketed by the 1840 census (official date: 1 June), which includes the wife, and the conception of Rhoda (b. June 1841) by Shadrack's second wife, Elizabeth Cooksey.⁴²

A prompt remarriage was common in their society for widowers with small children. Shadrack's two boys would have been about 5 months and 2½, respectively.

On 27 February 1841, William received patents to two tracts of federal land:

- SW½ NW¼ Section 20, Township 8N, Range 12E, Choctaw Meridian, 40 acres
- E½ NE¼ Section 19, Township 8N, Range 12E, Choctaw Meridian, 79.93 acres

As typically happened, *several* years had passed since William had “entered” this land at the Columbus land office, paying in cash the mandated \$1.25 per acre for government land.

The patents state that he was, at the time he purchased the land, a resident of Neshoba County.⁴⁶ The typical pattern was for a yeoman family to first settle a tract of unoccupied land and make a small clearing for home, garden, and the start of a cash crop. After one or two years of testing the productivity of the soil, they applied for the land at the federal land office that served their district. This pattern conforms to the 1834 Neshoba County tax data, showing that William paid a personal poll tax but not a land tax.

Shadrack made no purchase of government land—not in Neshoba or Newton. Newton County’s deeds have been destroyed by fire, eliminating the discovery of a potential land purchase from another individual.

COMMENTS:

Since 1842, William has acquired another 40 acres by purchase: the NW¼ NW¼ S20. This land had been patented in 1841 to James Barber. Note that one Samuel Barber appears on the 1837 list (above) of 9 men named Samuel in the county who could be a father of Shadrack Odom's first wife. No other Barbers took out federal land in Newton County. By 1840, no Barbers remained in the county.

This is William Odom's last appearance in the county. By 1850 he has relocated his family on the Gulf Coast, county of Hancock, amid Breland relatives. No known record accounts for the disposition of his land. He does not appear to have sold it to Shadrack. By the date of the 1850 census, Shadrack did own land, but the 1857 land tax roll places him in ownership of a different (though nearby) tract: W½ SE¼ S29 T8 R12.

COMMENTS:

The identification of Shadrack as “Fredrick” is a copying error on the part of the 1860 enumerator. Between 1840 and 1880, census takers were required to produce the census in triplicate. The original would be posted locally. The two copies would be sent to (a) the state’s secretary of state; and (b) the U.S. Census Bureau. That federal *copy* is the one that has been microfilmed and digitized.

Copying errors are rampant on these federal copies. Census takers were frequently caught in downpours, their saddlebags got wet—including the original census forms that they carried with them—and ink smeared on those forms. When they sat down at home to make the additional copies, names were often unreadable. Other errors and omissions on the federal returns reflected carelessness and a range of other factors.

Some researchers attempt to reconcile this copying error of his name by calling him “Shadrack Frederick.” That creates an error in his identification. Double given names were not common in the era of his birth—unless a child was given the name of a hero such as “Andrew Jackson,” “George Washington,” “Benjamin Franklin,” “John Wesley,” etc. No other record created by or for this man calls him anything other than Shadrack in one of the variants by which it was commonly spelled.

No records document this phase of Shadrack's life. Two relevant family traditions have been recorded. Both are compatible with (a) the fact that no surviving records documents military service for Shad and (b) known military records of Shad's sons Samuel, John, Wm. C., and Cader P.⁶⁹

Esrom Odom, son of Shad's son Robert Alexander, reports that his grandfather Shad "died during the Civil War." His phrasing did not imply that Shadrack was *killed* in service.⁷⁰

Thulmar (Jeffcoat) Shown, granddaughter of Shad's son Samuel, reports a tradition that her Odom ancestors felt like many Southern yeomen: it was a rich man's war and a poor man's fight. Five of Shad's sons would serve; at least one (Eli) joined when he was just 15. No evidence suggests that Shadrack himself served, though he was still of draft age when the draft law was passed in April 1862. Like many who joined, Shad's sons are said to have returned home without leave at harvest time; and an occasional muster roll in their service files does cite them as "deserted." Had they been caught at home, they would have been shot; but Shadrack, who was not a slaveowner, had no one left at home to help plant or gather the crops needed to feed their numerous young children, except his wife and Sam's. Shad and his AWOL sons, Thulmar reported, avoided capture by digging a brush-covered pit in the woods behind Shad's house. When the hoofs of horses were heard coming down the road, they headed for the pit and pulled the brush over them. "The rich folks called them *slackers*," Thulmar said, "but they had no choice."⁷¹

The landless widow and children of Shadrack abandoned Newton County in this period and relocated in adjacent Leake. The time frame is extrapolated from the fact that Elizabeth's son Cal married Sarah E. "Sallie" Stevens, 6 November 1872, Leake Co.⁷² Younger siblings would also marry in Leake later in that decade; and all of Elizabeth's offspring, as well as Shad's son Samuel, are enumerated in Leake in 1870.

COMMENT:

I have not found the widowed Elizabeth Cooksey in either census year. Also missing:

1900-1910: the daughter Eliza (Odom) Stephens who lived adjacent to Elizabeth in 1880.

1900: Shadrack's son Samuel, who died in 1909.

In 1910, Samuel's aged widow Elizabeth (née Elizabeth Jane Boyd, daughter of Elmira Parks Boyd) is found living with her married daughter Carrie Mae (Odom) Jeffcoat. The Jeffcoats, according to their daughter Thulmar (Jeffcoat) Shown, also lived near "Granny Odom," Shad's widow who, Thulmar thought, was "No kin to us, but we loved her like a grandmother."

Thulmar, as she aged, worried that she would end up without a home and, in her words, "just an old woman with a suitcase." This seems to have been a common plight of elderly females in her ancestral line.
